# Council calls for pause on MDBP

MOIRA Shire Council has resolved to request the Federal Government delays further implementation of the Murray Darling Basin

The resolution, which was introduced as urgent general business by Cr Ed Cox at council's August meeting, has three parts, and resolves that Moira Shire Council will:

1. Call upon the Australian Federal Government to delay further implementation of the Murray Darling Basin Plans water recovery targets until research commissioned by the Federal Water Minister into the social economic impacts on basin communities is available, the Australian Consumer and Competition Commission has completed its review on aspects of the basin plan and more rigorous scientific research is undertaken on the basin plans objective of maintaining the South Australian lower lakes as freshwater.

2. Encourage the Victorian and NSW State Governments to broaden their review of the sustainability of inter valley water transfers and its impact on river health and the Barmah National Park to include the proposition that Victorian and NSW water security arrangements be consolidated so that the southern connected basins water resources are managed as an integrated system.

3. Seek the Victorian State Government's acknowledgement that the current water trading arrangements in Victoria are exposing critical food and fibre sectors to industry collapse due to unsustainable water prices and urge the State Government to implement water trading zones and establish water trading rules that will limit manipulation of the water market by investors that are not directly involved in agriculture.

An impassioned, and at times emotional, er Cox called on governments at a state and federal level to show greater leadership on the issue of water availability, particularly with regards to the MDBP.

Cr Cox represents the Murray River Group of Councils, of which moira Shire Council is a member, on the Murray-Darling Basin Advisory Group which is a 33 member advisory group appointed by the Victorian Government to provide consultation to the Murray-Darling Basin Authority.

After much discussion, during which all councillors spoke to the desperate state of water availability and cost and the necessity of the resolution, the motion was passed by a unanimous vote.

#### Snakes on the move in north east

THE weather may have been up and down like the proverbial yo-yo in recent weeks, but it has erred on the warm side enough to make our cold-blooded reptile friends more active, and a lot more visible in the local area.

The Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Regional Manager Environmental Compliance, Nathan Stamkos said snakes are emerging from their winter hibernation to bask in the sun and to search for food and a mate.

The recent sunny weather also means people are spending more time outdoors and it is quite likely they will encounter a snake," Mr Stamkos said.

"Eastern brown snakes are the most common in north east Victoria, with the occasional tiger snake or red bellied black snake, which are usually found around wetlands, creeks and rivers.

'These three species are highly venomous, but it is rare for them to bite people. Most snake bites are received by people who try to capture or kill a snake.

"Snakes can be known to bite animals, such as dogs, if they feel threatened. If your dog or cat encounters a snake, the best course of action is to remove your pet from the area or tie it up while the snake passes, and if you suspect your pet has been bitten take it to

'Snakes are generally very shy and prefer to keep away from people and often when a snake is found in a backyard it's because it's moving through the area to other habitat.

"Being aware that snakes may be around, and being informed about how to react to them, are the most important aspects of managing snakes," Mr Stamkos said.

DELWP are urging people who live in an area with snakes to

- When left alone, snakes present little or no danger to people.
- If you see a snake, keep calm and move yourself and anyone with you (including pets) away from the area.
- Don't attempt to capture or harm snakes. Instead call DELWP on 136 186 for further advice, or call a licensed snake catcher. • Maintain lawns and clean up around your house, as snakes are
- attracted to shelter such as piles of rocks and timber, sheets of metal, and building materials. • Undertake first aid training and ensure your first aid kit con-
- tains several compression bandages, and if someone is bitten, call 000 immediately. Mr Stamkos said DELWP wanted to remind everyone that

snakes play an important role in our ecosystem and are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975. "It is illegal to capture, harm, or kill them. Reports of people

wilfully destroying protected wildlife will be investigated accord-

#### Haystack fire keeps local fire brigades busy

A HAYSTACK fire at Kaarimba kept local fire brigades busy in the past week, with three of five call-outs relating to the single incident.

The initial call occurred last Friday, September 13, at 7.05pm, with Kaarimba, Numurkah Nathalia, Waaia, Kotupna, and Wunghnu brigades, along with the Shepparton aerial pumper, responding to a hay shed fire at the corner of Barmah/Shepparton Road and Kaarimba Road.

Around 200 tonnes of straw bales were in the shed, along with a tractor that is suspected to have been the cause of the fire.

A few bales of straw were pulled out before the fire got to them and the area around the fire was made safe and the fire was left to burn out.

At 4.40pm on Saturday Kaarimba, Katunga, Nathalia, Numurkah, Waaia and Shepparton's aerial pumper were called to a reported hay shed fire at Walshes Bridge Road, Numurkah.

The Vic Fire operator put a stop-call out to all brigades after further conversation with the caller established that it was actually the Kaarimba hay stack fire, which was still burning, that the caller could see.

Kaarimba, Nathalia, Waaia and Shepparton's aerial pumper were again called out to the same fire at 5.45pm on Monday. No further action was required, and all brigades were stopped enroute.

On Tuesday, September 10, at10.30am, Numurkah, Katunga and Shepparton's aerial pumper were turned out to a fire in a wood heater at Williams Street, Numurkah.

The fire had produced a loud bang and was making fireballs inside the heater. The heater was closed down, but because of a poor seal around the heater door the fire would suck in air and cause fire balls.

The fire brigade used a thermal imaging camera to check if there were any hot spots in the ceiling and around the heater, but none were found. The property owners were advised to let the fire burn out, and to replace the rope seal in the door. Katunga and Shepparton brigades were not required.

Numurkah, Katunga, Wunghnu and Tallygaroopna brigades responded to a false alarm just after midnight on Saturday, when they were called to a reported grass fire at the corner of the Goulburn Valley Highway and Irrigation Road, Numurkah. No sign of a fire could be found. Police also

### Fostering safety and connection for kids

KATUNGA'S Kellie McLinden said the question she is most often asked about caring for foster children is whether it breaks her heart when they leave.

"It's not easy, but you go into it knowing that they will be with you for a period of time and then leave," she said.

"Besides, a little bit of pain on my part is nothing when I know the positive difference it has made in their lives, so it's well worth it," she said.

Last week was foster care week in Victoria, but in Kellie's house it was business as usual - running a household and getting herself off to work as a primary school teacher, and her 13 year-old foster child off to school, every day.

Kellie, who is about to turn 35, has fostered more than 20 children, ranging in age from two to 13, since she became a foster carer five years ago. Placement lengths have ranged from a single night's emergency care to eight months.

Kellie said she first really considered the concept of fostering during her first year as a teacher when she was working at a 'challenging' school.

"Some of the kids had a lot of things going on at home and I would wish that I could take them home with me instead," she said.

"Some of them have such tragic back-stories and they have absolutely no choice in the matter, it's completely beyond their control.

"To be able to offer them safety and stability, if even only temporarily, is so rewarding."

Kellie said that despite their sometimes troubled backgrounds, she was yet to experience behaviour from her foster children much beyond what you'd expect from any child.

"You need to really like kids to do this because they will behave like kids."

Whilst some parts of being a foster carer are naturally challenging, Kellie said some parts were also easier than she expected.

Still, she said, it's been a learning curve.

"Being single with no kids of my own, it's been a pretty big learning experience.

"Toilet training a two year-old boy was a bit of a conundrum. I'd never toilet trained a child before and I didn't have a male in the house to model the behaviour for him, so I really had to think about that one."

For all the challenges, Kellie said they are far outweighed by the rewards.

"The best part is seeing the change in them when they start to relax a bit and start feeling safe and comfortable and connected in your home. That's really wonderful."

Janene Ingram, team leader of Berry Street's foster carer recruitment program in Shepparton, said the organisation's foster carers are wonderfully diverse in terms of age, background, sexual orientation, relationship status and experience.

"We are always in need of more foster carers, so if you are over 21 and can offer a child or young person their own room in a safe and nurturing home environment, we will welcome your application," she said.

"We welcome carers from all backgrounds, cultures and experiences - married, single, or samesex couples, with or without children, divorced or de facto."

#### What type of care is needed?

You can nominate the type of care you would like to provide and, as part of the application process, Berry Street will work with you to help you make a final decision on the option that best suits you.

Berry Street is seeking carers to provide:

- Respite care (one or two weekends a month).
- Emergency care (for children who require an immediate placement).• Short-term care (less than six months).
- Long-term care (more than six months).

### Evolution in stroke treatment doesn't reach regions

AN evaluation of 20 years of the Stroke Foundation's National Stroke Audit Program has found more needs to be done to increase access to best practice stroke treatment and care for regional and rural Australians.

While more Australians are surviving stroke than ever before, not all treatment is equal.

Stroke Foundation Clinical Council Chair Professor Bruce Campbell said stroke is always a time-critical medical emergency, but it is highly treatable and a good recovery is possible.

"The challenge is to ensure all Australians can access life-saving treatment when they need it. At the moment, they are not," Professor Campbell said.

"Ongoing inequalities in acute stroke care and services are costing lives and leaving thousands of patients with unnecessary disability. Stroke attacks the brain, the human control centre, and can change lives in an instant.

"Australians living in regional and rural areas are among those most impacted due to geographical barriers to stroke specialists, but this inequity can be addressed by stroke telemedicine"

Despite advancements in acute stroke treatment in the past two decades, the disease continues to place a heavy burden on Australia as numbers rise.

There will be more than 56,000 strokes in Australia in 2019 alone and that figure is on track to reach more than 132,000 by 2050, equating to one stroke every four minutes.

Some states and territories have invested in stroke telemedicine systems which provide regional hospitals with 24/7 access, via video, to stroke specialists based in metro areas.

"We now need a national approach to stroke telemedicine to ensure all Australians can access

time critical stroke treatment no matter where they live," Professor Campbell said.

The Stroke Foundation's National Audit program delivers an annual snapshot of stroke treatment and care, highlighting areas where the system is working well and where changes are needed

It empowers clinicians, health administrators and government to drive quality improvement.

Stroke Foundation Chief Executive Officer Sharon McGowan said the 20 year audit evaluation highlighted how much the state of stroke has changed in this time.

"The good news is, the number of hospitals providing the blood clot dissolving therapy of thrombolysis has increased, and breakthrough clot removing endovascular thrombectomy has become standard, as well as a significant increase in the number of patients receiving care in a specialised stroke unit," Ms McGowan said. "How-

ever, there is still not enough emphasis on mood assessment for patients, psychology services and risk factor modification.

"We know mood or mental health issues are barriers to recovery from stroke, we also know four in 10 survivors will go onto experience another stroke within 10 years, even though many of these could be prevented.

"This report highlights we must do more in these areas."

Ms McGowan said, with more Australians surviving stroke thanks to improved stroke treatments, we must now focus our energies on rehabilitation and secondary stroke prevention.

"Demand is growing for high quality rehabilitation services that will allow patients to recover and live their best life possible after stroke. We must ensure stroke survivors are not denied access to these vital supports," she said.

### Terms of reference for NAPLAN review set

THE Victorian, New South Wales and Queensland governments have released the terms of reference for their broad review of NAPLAN and standardised testing of school students.

The review will identify what a standardised testing regime in Australian schools should deliver, assess how well NAPLAN achieves this, and identify short and longer-term improvements that can be made.

The Victorian Government said in a statement that, while a form of standardised test

will always be needed, this review will include looking at whether NAPLAN should continue in its current form.

The review will consider whether NAPLAN is meeting the needs of governments, schools, parents and students – including how accurate and appropriate the test is, whether the right year levels are being tested, and how well the test assesses student and system performance over time.

The review will draw on evidence from international assessment programs and other recent

reviews of NAPLAN to identify best practice and inform the review's recommendations.

A panel of education experts will lead the review including Emeritus Professor Barry McGaw, Professor Claire Wyatt-Smith and Emeritus Professor William Louden.

Victorian Education Minister James Merlino said that, with NAPLAN having been in place for more than decade, it is common sense to review it and see what changes should be made to ensure it is meeting the needs of schools, parents and students.

"The review may lead to significant change or it may recommend scrapping NAPLAN all together and replacing it with something new – but we will always need some form of standardised testing," he said.

The panel will present its interim findings and immediate improvements to Education Council in December, and a final report in 2020. A full list of the terms of reference is available at www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/naplan-review.aspx.

# Band and building can't be kept down

WHEN you look at the histories of the Numurkah Town Band and the building it calls home, it's hard not to form the belief that their destinies are tied together.

Both came into existence in 1883 and have seen their fortunes ebb and flow in the 136 years since, and both are currently experiencing a resurgence - with the building now undergoing renovations that should see it standing proud well into the future, and the band seeing a recent resurgence in membership.

The band hall, as it has long been known, started life as a hotel dining room; part of the Railway Gate Hotel located close to the Quinn St railway crossing in a time when rail was the dominant form of long-distance transport.

The band started life in 1883 with, as far as it can be established, no name and no official bandmaster - though a Constable Clark was the accepted leader.

By 1904 it had been named Numurkah Town Band and was rehearsing regularly in stables owned by Mr T Richards.

A *Numurkah Leader* article from 1933 quotes an original band member - a euphonium player by the name of Mr Alex Webster - as saying that in its first 50 years the band went into recess several times.

According to Mr Webster, when it was operating, the band practiced in places as diverse as the cellar of a home, the old fire station and a hide and skin store. Though it did own its own rehearsal space in the early 1900s (location unknown), this had to be sold to pay off debts the band had incurred.

For many years, the band rehearsed in the Presbyterian hall whilst still seeking a permanent home. That chance finally arose in 1948 when the RSSILA (now the RSL) decided to sell its club rooms.

The building in question was in fact the former dining room of the Railway Gate Hotel, which had been relocated years earlier to land owned by the Numurkah Masonic Lodge at the corner of Quinn and McCaskill Streets.

For the princely sum of £200 the deal was done, and the band once again took possession of it's own band hall where it happily resided for many years.

When the Masonic Lodge decided to build a new lodge building at the site around 50 years ago, the weatherboard building was moved once again, to its current position at Stringer Walk, on Crown land by the Broken Creek.

Unfortunately, it hasn't all been smooth sailing, and over the years the building has been the

target of vandalism on a number of occasions.

In one incident, the windows were all broken, and in others, instruments were taken from the hall and thrown in the creek. Three separate attempts were made to burn the hall down.

However, a local institution of such long-standing enjoys much support from the community, and band president Peter Heard told the *Leader* that security measures have been put in place to prevent further damage.

"We raised enough money ourselves to build a security fence to keep vandals out, and Dyson's IGA also donated money for a security system," he said.

"The fence spoils the view of the building a bit, but it has stopped the damage."

The view of the building is especially fine at the moment, with recent renovation works making it look as good as it ever has.

Thanks to funds raised by the band itself, and contributions from Moira Shire and local service clubs, the exterior of the building has been repaired and repainted in heritage colours to make it both solid and beautiful.

A new kitchen is also on the way - one element of which band secretary Dorothy Heard is particularly excited about.

"We're going to have hot water for the first time ever and I can't wait," she said.

The new kitchen, and hot water, will make the preparation of supper much easier, which is just as well given the recent swell in band numbers, with four new members having joined since the start of the year.

"We were down to four members at the start of 2004 because five members left at the end of 2003 for various reasons," Peter said.

"We stopped doing play-outs because we didn't have the numbers, but we kept rehearsing and numbers gradually went back up and now we're up to 29."

The band suffered a bit of a blow with the loss of it's major sponsor Dyson's IGA, and is now seeking new sponsorship, but it has been through worse.

"We have to regular expenses such as power, insurance and instrument repairs, so sponsorship is really valuable to us, but we are managing through fundraising.

"We have a wonderful team in the band and everyone hops in and helps."

It's hard to keep a good band - or building -down.

# Mental health commitment welcomed

MENTAL Health Victoria has welcomed the Federal Government's commitment to delivering the world's best mental health system for Australia in its Long Term National Health Plan announced by Health Minister Greg Hunt recently.

Mental Health Victoria CEO Angus Clelland said the Morrison Government's pledge to rate mental health equally alongside physical health has long been urged by consumers, carers and mental health services to transform a system that is fragmented, complex and incomplete.

Mr Clelland said the peak body was particularly pleased with the commitments in the plan to develop a children's mental health strategy and for the widespread rollout of adult mental centres to tackle the 'missing middle' in mental health services.

"Almost four million Australians suffer from some form of mental illness each year and 50% of us will face a mental health challenge in our lives," he said.

"Yet, sadly, mental health has often been viewed as the poor cousin of the health system."

Ensuring mental health is afforded the same attention and resources as physical health, however, will require a major shift in attitudes, skills, training and resources, and cooperation between federal, state and territory Governments.

"We urge all parties to get on board with the Federal Government and work collaboratively towards a new national mental health partnership." Mr Clelland said a bigger focus is needed on children and young people, given that 50% of mental health conditions present by the age of 14 years and 75% by the age of 24.

"Prevention, early identification and age appropriate interventions are needed to lessen the lifeline impact of mental illness and ensure that young Australians can have happy and fulfilling lives," he said.

Mental Health Victoria and its partner organisation, Australians for Mental Health, have long advocated for adult mental health centres as an important means of bridging the gap between GPs and the hospital system.


It is expected that these centres will provide accessible team-based services that address the social, medical and economic aspects of mental ill-health in the community.

"This important commitment will provide much needed support for thousands of Australians and help prevent unnecessary hospital admissions and re-admissions," Mr Clelland said. "They will save lives."

The Federal Government's commitment to conduct a new National Survey of Mental Health and Wellbeing is also welcome.

"It has been 12 years since the Australian Bureau of Statistics conducted the last survey and we are starved for current data on changes in prevalence rates, service access, and whether services are assisting people with recovery," Mr Clelland said.

"After many years of neglect, we can now be optimistic about the future of mental health," Mr Clelland said.

### Girl guide Josie gets new badge

STRATHMERTON guide leader Josie Munro OAM received another badge to add to her uniform last Tuesday when she was presented with a 60 year service award at an event at the Strathmerton public hall.

The presentation was a little late coming, with the Strathmerton guide troupe, which Josie started, having celebrated 60 years last year.

The inaugural meeting of Strathmerton Girl Guides took place on August 13, 1958, and though membership has gone up and down in the 60 years since, it is still going strong with eight current members under Josie's guidance today.

With so many former Strathmerton guides having travelled from far and wide to attend last year's reunion, you could be excused for thinking attendance at last week's presentation might be a little thin, but not so.

Around 65 people attended the event, many past guides among them - including one of Josie's original troupe of six.

Josie had been a guide for several years as a teenager, and was a 19 year-old in her first year out of teacher's college when the town of Strathmerton decided she should start a guide troupe in the town.

Josie said that when she happened to mention to her landlady that she was a former guide and ranger, word quickly spread and she wasn't given all that much choice in the matter.

"The soldier settler scheme was in full swing and there were a lot of young families and lots of little girls who wanted to join, and I had started teaching at the primary school so the parents all approached me about it," she said.

Josie has no regrets though, and has enjoyed every minute of it.

"I've just done what I wanted to do with the girls and it's been a lot of fun," she said.

Under Josie's watch, Strathmerton has produced eight Queen's guides - the highest award a girl guide can achieve - as well as five guides who have achieved the Baden-Powell award.

Josie was presented with her 60 year service medal by Girl Guides Victoria State Commissioner Lynne Emblim, who observed that she didn't get to present many 60 years service awards.

"It is a long time I suppose, but it's gone very quickly," Josie said.

"I love working with children and I don't feel my age, so I've just kept going."



Josie does have the occasional thought of retiring, but said just when she starts thinking about it, one of her guides declares they want to attempt to become a Queen's guide.

"I can't leave them if they're working towards becoming a Queen's guide. They need me to mentor them."

Perhaps when there is a break in Queen's guide training, Josie may hang up her uniform for good, knowing she can leave the troupe in the ca-

pable hands of fellow Strathmerton guide leader Lynda Dickson.

"Lynda is a good leader and perfectly capable of leading on her own. I'm very pleased to know that if I ever give it up it will be in good hands and won't fold."

For now though, Josie doesn't have time to discuss retirement, there are prospective Queen's guides to mentor.

"Ask me again in a few years," she said.

### LESSONS FROM THE PAST, FOR THE FUTURE

Here at St Mary of the Angels Secondary College our Year 9 students are blessed and extremely privileged to be able to take part in a dedicated Immersion Program, which has been developed and strengthened over many years.

The program begins with learning about the local Aboriginal history and culture of the Yorta Yorta and Bangerang people; sharing stories and gaining insight into the local history and culture of the people whose lands we live and work on.

Students come together to share a number of local immersion experiences to better develop their cultural knowledge before sectioning off into small groups which explore Aboriginal traditions, comparative histories and stories across Victoria and into NSW, Western, Central, Northern and North Eastern Australia.

Immersion Program Leader, Gabby Cunningham explained that the Immersion program is designed to provide a hands on insight into our rich Aboriginal history and the difference between tribal cultures across the country. The program provides an opportunity for shared learning and understanding between our College community and the Aboriginal communities with whom the students and teachers engage.

Gabby said, "We are very fortunate to have this continuing opportunity to gain the knowledge of Aboriginal culture, which the Elders and Aboriginal

representatives so generously share with us.

"You can sit in a classroom and share a discussion about culture, but to actually walk the land and speak with Aboriginal Elders about their experiences, to share with them the stories of Dreaming and to connect with sacred places is something which cannot be replicated to its fullest extent in a classroom environment."

"To have the opportunity to immerse our Year 9 students in the rich traditions of all facets of Australian Aboriginal culture, to embrace it and to share understanding and acceptance is so very special.

"Our dedicated Aboriginal Immersion program includes experiences with the

Yorta Yorta and Bangerang people in the Goulburn Valley, in Victoria at Camp Jungai, Geriwerd (the Grampians), Wurundjeri Taungurung as well as interstate in Lake Mungo NSW, One Arm Point WA, Yippirinya NT, Jabiru NT, Balgo and Billiluna WA.

Gabby added, "It's incredibly important to know our local history first and foremost, and to be proud of our local culture.

"Through the program you really see the development of connection to country, the relationships, the cultural understanding, the respect for Aboriginal history and you also see how much these experiences bring the students together. It's a very special, very privileged opportunity for all of us who participate in the Year 9 program."

Immersion as a student leader. This award focuses on enhancing and strengthening leadership skills and I'm extremely grateful to have been part of such an enriching immersive experience.

"Getting to know the 16 Year 9 students, the majority of whom I had never met before was a highlight for me. Watching their growth throughout the week, the way they grew closer and absorbed everything around them in the unique places we visited was inspiring.

"We were welcomed so warmly into the Yipirinya school community and immediately felt like the kids just wanted to be around us. We had loads of fun joining them for sport at lunchtimes and in the afternoons. It was obvious the Year 9 students were excited about being there as they shared their

experiences at the end of the day with the group.

"I am also extremely thankful for my personal growth, the knowledge I gained as well as the special connections I made could never have been learnt from reading or hearing about it second hand. The importance of respect, kindness and teamwork were highlighted during the trip. I learnt that by simply being kind and friendly and encouraging everyone to share their opinion that I could be a leader and I do not need a title or certain achievements. I just needed to be someone positive they could look up to or come to for help.

### Wildflower walk now open for all

THOSE of us lucky enough to live in the vicinity of the Broken Creek are truly spoiled by the natural beauty available right on our doorstep.

That beauty is now more accessible than ever, thanks to a new brochure launched yesterday providing a guide to the natural wonders that can be found along the creek in the centre of

The Nathalia Botanical Walk is the result of a collaboration between a diverse range of groups including NADDCO, Nathalia Wildflower Group, Moira Shire, U3A, Western Moira Tourism, Bendigo Bank and Yorta Yorta Nation.

The new walk is an easy route along a bitumen pathway on the Broken Creek levee bank, stretching 410 metres along Church St from the main bridge, across Squeezy bridge and 410 metres back along Muntz Ave on the other side.

Though there are 28 species of flora listed in the brochure, which can be obtained from the Barmah Forest Heritage & Education Centre,

that outlines the route, nine are to be found photographed and explained in detail.

Judy Ormond, who along with fellow Nathalia Wildflower Group Lyn Loger has been a driving force behind the project and produced the photographs for the brochure, said it had taken a year of solid work to get it off the ground.

"We've studied the trees, native plants and vegetation, and documented and photographed them in every season," she said.

"It's a beautiful walk with so much to see if you know what to look for, and we really wanted to share that with the district and visitors."

Dead shrubbery and flood debris was cleaned away from the creek banks, mulched and returned to the site as part of the project.

Choosing a launch date for the walk and accompanying brochure proved to be perhaps the easiest part, as yesterday, September 17, marked 100 years since the Kurrajong trees and Port Jackson figs were planted along Bromley and

Election of President.

Cr. Schier was elected President for the ensuing term, on the motion of Crs. McLean and Ross, the allowance being fixed at £63. The council discussed the filling of the chair in committee, and on the motion being put Cr. Thornton called for a division.

The voting was six to five in favor of Cr. Schier, those present voting as under:-

For Cr. Schier --- Crs. J. H. and Geo. Tuckett, Ball, McLean, Ross, and Gordon.

# Viking exhibition now open

SOME eras of history never lose their fascination, and despite their access to all items technological, St Mary of the Angels year eight students found plenty to interest them when they studied the Vikings this term.

As part of a curriculum-prescribed humanities unit that focussed on the ancient Norse culture, each year eight student was required to create a Viking 'artefact' with the results being curated for an exhibition which has now opened at the Barmah Forest Heritage & Education Centre.

Fortunately, Viking culture offers plenty of areas of interest.

From long ships to long houses, from weapons and armour to myths and symbols and games and clothing, all students were able to find some aspect of Viking life to inspire them.

Humanities teacher Julie Riley told the *Leader* the students were given total control of the work they produced.

"We find the students engage with the topic a lot more if they get to choose which aspect of Viking culture most interests them, and they can take ownership of what they make," she said.

Weapons proved a popular choice, particularly with the male students, and Sean Watters told the *Leader* he chose to make an axe (albeit from wood) because they were an essential tool in Viking life.

"They used axes for everything," he said.

"They used them to cut wood and slaughter animals as well as for weapons. A good axe was important to a Viking's survival."

And what did he think of Viking culture on the whole?

"It was interesting to learn about it. They were quite organised socially, but pretty barbaric."

Molly Jackson told the Leader that she found the Vikings' use of runes fascinating, which prompted her decision to make a type of runic compass known as a vegvisir, which is Icelandic for 'way finder'.

"The vegvisir is only mentioned in one ancient manuscript, but it's believed that they were painted on long ships before they set sail because the Vikings believed the runes would help guide the way in any weather even if the way was not known," she said.

Meg Guppy's said the Norse myths really appealed to her, especially the tale of Fenrir the wolf, son of Loki.

"The myths described him as a very large wolf who breathed fire, which I really liked," she said.

"The gods were effected of him so they she had

"The gods were afraid of him so they chained him up, which I thought was pretty stupid. He eventually broke free and battled Odin, swallowing him whole.

"I painted him before the battle, with Odin in his shadow."

Perhaps unsurprisingly, one of the most pop-

ular works among the students was a multimedia piece created by Osgar Quinane which used clips from the Marvel Thor movies to show how Thor would have appeared in the Vikings' eyes, and how he would have fit in Viking culture.


Moira Shire Arts, Culture and Events team leader Marilyn Gourley, who created the exhibition, said it provided a good opportunity for the community to see what the young people are doing in school, displayed in a community space.

"We ran a couple of workshops for the students on how to present their work so they had an understanding of taking it from a concept to being properly presented in an exhibition," she said.

"As part of that, we taught them about writing the labels for their works, so there would be some consistency, and make the exhibition more cohesive."

# Industry tour enlightens and inspires

NUMURKAH Secondary College (NSC) senior students were given some more food for thought about their futures last week, as they took their second tour of local industries this

Students visited Graincorp Oilseeds, Yarroweyah Engineering, Booth Transport and Numurkah Home Timber and Hardware to find out about thriving industries in their own area, and what employment opportunities are available.

The industry visits were organised by Goulburn Murray Local Learning and Employment Network (GMLLEN) in partnership with Moira Shire Council's economic development team.

GMLLEN project consultant Kristen Elliott said that it was a chance for students to see what employment opportunities were available in

their own communities. "Students often don't realise how much industry there is within just a few kilometres of where they live, and how many people those industries employ across a huge range of roles," she said.

"These tours are a chance to open their eyes to that, and to raise their aspirations a little as to what they can go on to in their own district when they finish school."

NSC careers advisor David Kelly, who accompanied students on the tours, alongside VCAL teacher Keith Ward, said the program exposes students to career opportunities in the local area they may nor have thought of.

"Students don't necessarily realise what is available locally beyond traditional roles like nurse, lawyer, builder, teacher," he said.

"These tours plant a seed about other things they might want to consider. The tours allow then to get really direct feedback from the employers about what they need from employees

and we can come back to school and look at pathways, and work on employability skills." Ms Elliott said the industry tours give students

an opportunity to visit medium to large local and regional workplaces and see first-hand what it's like to work in different industry areas. 'Students are given an opportunity to speak

with professionals about their job. The tours also provide a key opportunity to open students' eyes to new possibilities and showcases the great array of different job opportunities that are available in their local region," she said.

"It also gives students some insights into employer expectations and advice from potential employers about what could make them stand out in a job interview and criteria they are looking for in employees."

Ms Elliott said all of the industries involved had been extremely supportive of the program,

a sentiment echoed by Mr Kelly.

'We're very grateful to the local businesses who give up their time to support the school," he said.

The tours are a great opportunity for the students and give them a lot to think about."

Ms Elliott said that the program is also a way to ensure that local school staff have current knowledge about the opportunities for students in their area, so they can show them the pathways to employment locally.

"We really want to maintain a strong connection between schools and industry, because that really works to everybody's advantage," she said.

"Local industry needs employees, and they are keen to encourage young people to stay in the local area and be part of local industry. Young people need jobs so they can build a strong future here and this is a way for local industries, and local schools, to show them how they can do that."




