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Grab a freebie to prevent food waste

NUMURKAH Community House manager Nicole Wells has a simple request for the people of Numurkah - please come and take some free

Like all good ideas, since starting a few months ago the free pantry has evolved.

Thanks to a new collaboration with Foodshare, the pantry is overflowing with fresh, refrigerated, long-lasting and non-perishable food items, and Nicole wants to see those items find a home in household pantries across Numurkah.

Nicole said that a misconception that the pantry is solely for the use of low income households may be keeping people away.

"The point of the pantry is to reduce food

"This is excess product and if people don't take it, it will end up in landfill and that would be a

"Everybody needs food and there is absolutely no need for anybody to be embarrassed about accessing the free pantry - you'll be doing the planet a favour by helping to keep it out of landfill. We would love anyone in the community to come and take what they can use."

Since the partnership with Foodshare, the pantry now includes refrigerated items, which at the moment include sour cream, cream cheese, haloumi, cheese slices and yoghurt.

Fresh produce includes potatoes, pumpkin and eggs, non-perishables include soups, sauces and stocks, and there is a range of long-lasting items including breakfast cereals, mayonnaise and rice.

Nicole said the range of food on offer will change according to availability.

"Some of the items will be fairly consistently available, whereas others will change according to what Foodshare has and what we are growing here in our vegetable garden," she said.

"When stocks begin to run low, we will arrange new deliveries, so there will always be items

Due to a number of vandalism incidents, the pantry is now locked inside when the community house is closed, but item pick-ups can be arranged by calling or texting 0458 972 416.

"The house is open every Tuesday between 9am and 2pm, and we are trying to arrange other times throughout the week as well to give greater access, so if anyone would like to volunteer to help out with being on site for an hour or so, that would be great," Nicole said.

"Unfortunately, people can only access the fridge items when the house is open, or if they call and organise a time.

"We can't leave the pantry out the front anymore when we're not here, but we are looking at installing some security and if anyone could help us out with that we would love to hear from

Show baking wins Tammy silver medal

THE smell of cinnamon in the Stone family's Katunga kitchen is more than enough to make the mouth water, and for good reason.

The delicious aroma is wafting off carrot and date muffins that won a silver medal at this year's Victorian Agricultural Society (VASL) state conference.

The prize winning baker is 16 year-old Tammy Stone, who won first prize in the junior category for a batch of the muffins at last year's Numurkah and Shepparton shows. The recipe for the muffins is a standard recipe supplied by VASL that all entrants must adhere to.

Tammy has been entering numerous categories at the Numurkah show for years, and shows dairy cattle at a number of regional

"I enter the baking, craft, photography and cattle categories and I really enjoy it," she said.

"If you win at Numurkah show you gain automatic entry to the Shepparton show and if you win there you go on to the Goulburn Valley Riverina Shows Association (GVRSA) regional competition."

In May, Tammy was announced winner for her carrot and date muffins for the GVRSA competition which gave her automatic entry to compete against the other nine regions in the VASL competition in July.

Whilst Tammy progressed to Shepparton show three years in a row - 2015, 2016 and 2017 - for photography, this is the first time she has progressed to state level.

"It was pretty exciting when they announced I won silver," she said.

"It was a bit strange because they don't actually taste the muffins, they just cut them open and judge them that way.

"The muffins are pretty yummy though carrot cake is actually my favourite so I like them a lot. They are especially good with cream cheese icing, but you can't ice them for the competition."

Tammy's mum Heather said she has always encouraged Tammy to enter items in the

"I think participating in local shows is good for kids, and it gives people something to look at," she said. Numurkah Agricultural and Pastoral Socie-

ty secretary Sue Aldridge described Tammy's silver medal win as a big achievement. Lots of people across the state enter these things, so to get second is really impressive,"

Finance workshops for next generation farmers

YOUNG farmers in northern Victoria and the Riverina will be among the first in Australia to access financial literacy workshops designed to give the next generation of farmers a 'leg up' in financial management to help grow their family business.

The practical one-day Farm Financial Skills Workshop will be held in Moama on August 27 and Benalla on August 28 as part of a national roll out of the program, which aims to reach 2000 up-and-coming farmers by 2020.

The workshops, which are free of charge, will be run by food and agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank with sessions on gross margin analysis, cash flow budgeting and interpreting financial statements.

History brought to life on unique tours

YOU may not immediately think of a cemetery as a place where history would come to life, but a new program of tours at Numurkah cemetery is changing that perception.

The tours are conducted by Numurkah Wunghnu Cemetery Trust (NWCT) secretary Bernadette Steward, who said they are part of a broader effort to make the cemetery more acces-

"The older section of the cemetery dates back to the 1800s and, understandably, over time it's gotten a bit shabby and there were a lot of unmarked graves," she said.

"I've been working on mapping it and identifying all of the graves and their occupants and trying to find out the stories of those buried there as much as possible because this is where the pioneers of Numurkah are buried."

The cemetery tours serve several purposes. Whilst they are a method of raising funds to go towards upkeep and improvement, they are also a valuable source of information and apprecia-

Glenice Holmes, who has been on two of the four tours held so far, said that they are a wonderful history walk for anyone interested in family or local history.

'I've been a member of the historical society for around 40 years so I already knew quite a bit but Bernadette always has some little extra piece of information that she's found, so the tours did add to my knowledge," she said.

"The tours are very interesting and newcomers to Numurkah's history would learn a lot."

For Bernadette, it's important for the community to know who the pioneers of Numurkah

"By learning about the pioneers who are buried here people can understand and appreciate what they did and how they helped make the town what it is," she said.

One such pioneer, who has himself proved a valuable source of information regarding other pioneers, is NWCT's first secretary James Cocky' Williams, who was born in 1853 and was buried in the cemetery following his death

"Cocky Williams kept diaries for 45 years from 1889 to 1934," Ms Steward said.

"In them he mentions a lot of the other pioneers so they have been a great resource regarding the history of the Numurkah district and the people who helped shape it.

They are considered so valuable as an historical account that they are kept at the State Library of Victoria."

Bernadette has slowly but surely been identifying the occupants of the unmarked graves, painstakingly cross-referencing the original map of the cemetery with the books that outline the layouts of the individual sections, to confirm the locations of graves and their occupants.

"It has been challenging, especially because

they are not in numerical order," she said.

"Plot 268 might sit next to plot two for some reason, so you can't assume anything.

"The catholic section was the worst, so I'm glad I did that first when I was full of energy and enthusiasm, otherwise I might have just thrown my hands up with it."

One of the aims of creating an accurate map of the cemetery is to be able to provide signage at the end of each row, as exists in the newer section, listing the names of those interred there.

Alongside the mapping of the cemetery, the NWCT committee has been working with other community groups to improve the appearance and amenity of the cemetery in general.

Thanks to donations from groups including Show Us Ya Wheels, Rotary Club of Numurkah, Lions Ladies, Goulburn Murray Credit Union and Numurkah Golf Club the cemetery's original gates have been removed for restoration, which is almost complete.

The original pavilion at the site, which was erected in 1889 at a cost of £39 and is heritage listed, was recently given a restorative coat of paint by the Numurkah Lions and Rotary clubs.

VCAL students from Numurkah Secondary College are also currently working on heritage style designs for the plinths to hold the planned row markers.

In the meantime, Bernadette is having fun unravelling mysteries alluded to on the existing grave markers.

"The head stone of a lady named Mary Hore said that she died at the Numurkah police cells, which was unusual and I knew there must be an interesting story there so I looked into it," she

"It turned out her husband was the policeman here at the time and she died of liver cancer. Her

infant son William was buried with her and the head stone was erected by friends of hers.

"I'm still not sure what the story was with William or why her husband didn't erect the head stone, but that's how it goes. Stories are never finished; they're always evolving.

Another fascinating story Bernadette has followed is that of Thomas Albert, who was known as Carl.

"He left Numurkah to fight in the First World War and was evacuated from Gallipoli. After the war he ended up living in Seattle in the USA and his children were born there.

"He came back to Numurkah to enlist in the Second World War and is buried here."

For Bernadette, her quest to learn all she can about Numurkah's former residents shows no signs of stopping.

"If you have family buried here, we'd love to hear from you. At some point we are going to have to think about some maintenance on some of the older monuments that are shifting a bit and could get dangerous.

"We'd love to work with the families on those." As for those unmarked graves, simple markers have been put in place, where possible, to identify the occupants, one of whom was the very first person buried at the cemetery.

"That was Michael Maroney," Bernadette said. "He was buried here in February 1883."

The Numurkah cemetery tours take place on the last Sunday of the month and places can be booked through Numurkah & District Historical Society.

Participation is by gold coin donation, with proceeds shared by Numurkah Wunghnu Cemetery Trust and Numurkah & District Historical Society.

Illegal wood harvesting patrols stepped up

PARKS Victoria authorised officers have stepped up patrols and surveillance over the past month to protect the habitats of native animals, following several cases of illegal tree felling and removal within parks and reserves in north-

Significant hollow trees have been cut down and removed from national parks, destroying important habitats for mammals, reptiles, birds and invertebrates.

Parks Victoria Acting Manager Science and Management Effectiveness, Dr John Wright, said tree hollows provide precious habitat for hundreds of species of native birds, mammals, reptiles and invertebrates.

"Amazing creatures like the squirrel glider, brush-tailed phascogale, regent parrot, red-tailed cockatoo and the tree goan na all depend on hollows for their survival," he said.

"It can take centuries for nature to create the hollows that so many of our unique and threatened wildlife rely on. Destroying these precious resources through selfish and reckless behaviour is a tragedy."

Since July, Operation Crookwell has targeted people who are allegedly cutting down trees to supply buyers with firewood.

In the latest seizure on August 8, Parks Victoria authorised officers and Victoria Police intercepted a man in possession of more than two cubic metres of wood, allegedly taken from Chiltern-Mount

Pilot National Park.

The man's vehicle, three chainsaws and the wood were confiscated. He will be charged with several offences including cutting and taking firewood in a national park, driving off road and destroying wildlife habitat.

Parks Victoria State-wide Enforcement Operations, Mercier said the agency takes a zero-tolerance approach to those breaking firewood collection laws, and anyone caught will be prose-

"It is illegal for people to fell trees or collect firewood in a national park. If you observe anyone causing damage to park habitat, removing wood or have information about environmental offences, please contact Parks Victoria on 13 1963," he said.

"All information will be treated confidentially."

At least six other people will be charged with various offences as part of the operation and a total of three motor vehicles, six chainsaws and seven cubic metres of wood have been seized as evidence, with the operation ongoing.

Firewood can only be collected from designated collection areas in certain areas during permitted

Highest deer harvest recorded in Victoria

LATEST research into deer hunting in Victoria shows the highest number of licensed recreational deer hunters harvesting the highest number of deer recorded.

The estimates of the 2018 deer harvest in Victoria report has found that 121,600 deer were harvested in 2018 an increase from 106,275 deer harvested in 2017.

The most commonly harvested species in 2018 was Sambar deer, with an estimated total harvest of 88,202, of which 55% were female.

Fallow deer were the second most commonly harvested species, with an estimated harvest of 30,552 deer - 65% of which were female - double the estimated harvest in 2017.

The number of licensed deer hunters peaked at 39,066 by the end of the year.

The research also shows that each licensed deer hunter was active for an average of 6.7 days in 2018, taking an average of 3.5 deer per year.

The total number of days spent hunting by all deer hunters in 2018 was 237,594 days.

The five areas where the most deer hunting occurred were Mansfield, Dargo, Myrtleford, Eildon and Wodonga. The five areas where the highest number of deer were harvested were Mansfield, Bright, Omeo, Dargo and Wodonga. Most of the deer were taken from public land.

Authority Game Management (GMA) CEO Graeme Ford said the findings in the report show the growing popularity of deer hunting, with the number of licensed deer hunters con-

"It is important to collect information about the number of deer harvested by recreational hunters each year," Mr

"Data obtained from this research will help to inform decisions about deer management and the management of public and private land in Victoria."

Throughout 2018, researchers regularly surveyed licensed deer hunters, asking questions about their hunting activity, including how many deer they harvested, where they hunted, what hunting methods were used, and the species of deer they successfully harvested.

The report is produced by GMA in collaboration with the Arthur Rylah Institute for Environmental Research.

Family violence reporting tool goes live

ily violence reporting tool to ensure timely and more accurate incident reports can be filed in the field.

Minister for Police and Emergency Services Lisa Neville announced the state-wide launch of the new Family Violence Report last week, after a successful two-year pilot.

The new tool allows police to make better decisions based on the information they collect when they respond to a family violence incident, improving accuracy and ensuring prompt referrals.

Officers can use their mobile devices to make the report, which provides greater guidance for risk assessment and management to protect more victims and hold more perpetrators to account.

The launch complements the recent

FRONT line police officers across completion of the mobile device roll "We're addressing family violence out to front line police, including gener- with a range of approaches that reflect al duties officers, highway patrol members, the operations response unit, transit and protective services officers.

> The new tool was piloted in Hobsons Bay, Maribyrnong, Wyndham, Brimbank and Melton. Police officers found it had a positive impact for victims and on their own work.

The reporting tool delivers on one of 277 recommendations from the Royal Commission into Family Violence.

The Victorian Government has delivered \$2.7 billion to implement all 227 recommendations and deliver reforms that will keep women and children safe.

Minister for Prevention of Family Violence Gabrielle Williams said the State Government is rebuilding the system from the ground up to keep women and children safe. the Royal Commission's recommendations," she said.

This has been supported by record funding of more than \$3 billion for police, with 3,135 new front line police, new police resources and stronger police powers and laws.

This investment includes 415 family violence specialists who are transforming Victoria Police's approach to what Minister Neville described as Victoria's number one law and order challenge.

Victoria Police responds to a family violence incident every seven minutes on average," Minister Neville said.

'We're giving Victoria Police the tools, resources and equipment they need to keep Victorians safe and address the scourge of family violence."
