Susan captivates

ROTARY Club of Numurkah's 2019 Business Breakfast was a huge success last Friday, as guest speaker Susan Alberti kept the 210 guests captivated with her inspirational life story.

Susan, who is the only Victorian woman to be a Member of the Order of Australia (AM), an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO), and a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC), shared her story

from the humble beginnings of her childhood in Bairnsdale, to owner of a major construction company and respected philanthropist.

Along the way, Susan has had to overcome personal tragedy, losing her first husband in an accident, and her daughter to complications from type one diabetes, as well as suffering her own health battles.

At each turn, Susan forged ahead, using tragedy to fuel her determination to make a difference.

A major focus of Susan's speech was her lifelong passion for Australian Rules Football, which she loved playing as a child, but had to stop aged 15 as there were no dedicated girls teams and she was not allowed to play alongside the boys past that point.

New fact check service for election campaign claims

WITH a federal election on the horizon, Australians now have access to a new free service that allows them to check claims made by politicians.

From today, Australian Associated Press is ramping up its free verification service, AAP FactCheck, to subject political parties of all persuasions to a higher degree of scrutiny.

AAP FactCheck, previously known as AAP CrossCheck, scrutinises statements made by public and political figures to determine the accuracy of their claims and quickly combat misinformation.

After a successful pilot program during the

NSW election campaign, AAP FactCheck will expand its operations in an effort to give all Australian voters greater confidence in the claims being made on the hustings.

The thorough, rigorous and independent methodology employed during the NSW trial resulted in AAP FactCheck being recommended for certification with the Poynter Institute's International Fact Checking Network (IFCN).

The IFCN sets the benchmark for all organisations undertaking verification work, and monitors their ongoing compliance to ensure a reliably high standard of work.

AAP FactCheck's mission is to verify content

within the same news cycle, making it as relevant as possible to both media and the public.

Headlines on the site at the moment that have been subjected to fact checking include: Is there more funding in the federal budget for a Queensland ring road than for climate change?; and Does the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party (SFF) want to give guns to 10-year-olds and relax the national firearms agreement?

Long-time media executive and journalist Louise Evans heads AAP FactCheck's team of experienced journalists based in both Sydney and Brisbane.

The operation is supported by Google News

Initiative but retains full editorial independence.

AAP Editor-in-Chief Tony Gillies said that, AAP believes this work has never been more important.

"The work we have been doing, independently testing and verifying public statements, has already received significant traction with Australian media," Mr Gillies said.

"As we move towards the federal election cycle, we have decided to adopt a new name for the service which better reflects and serves our endeavour."

Community turning nightmare back yard into a green dream

THE Numurkah community centre is working together with locals to create their very own community garden.

Nicole Wells and Jenna Simpson are two of the many working with this project.

They say that their aim is to make a space where people can come and go, feel safe, and learn how to grow, and use, plants in the kitchen.

“We really want this to be a space that benefits everybody,” Ms Simpson said.

The garden will be working in a biodynamic system, meaning that the garden will generate fertility through composting, cover cropping, and crop rotation.

Seeka Orchards at Bunbartha donated wooden crates for garden beds, and the community centre has purchased truck tyre rims from Nathalia men's shed as additional garden beds.

They have so far planted sunflowers, beans, and kale.

Ms Simpson said the kale, though edible, was actually planted for its natural pesticide properties, so they don't have to use chemicals.

“We want the garden to be as natural as it can be,” she said.

However, although the back yard of the Murray Ave community house is now clearly distinguishable as a fledgling vegetable garden, Ms Wells said a lot of work has gone into getting to this point.

“The space we had to work with was a nightmare,” she said.

The yard had a blanket of bindis covering most of the ground, leaving the dirt impossible to work with, and there was also a lot of rubbish that had been dumped, making the clean up process a struggle.

A community working bee held in March, combined with the assistance of certificate of general education for adults students from Numurkah Community Learning Centre, turned the tide however, and the space is well on its way to being a thriving vegetable garden.

Though the community house's current horticulture students are responsible for the planting and growing for now, it is intended that the space become a true community garden for Numurkah residents.

“We really want it to be a shared space where people can come and grow fruits and vegetables for their own families and to share with others,” Ms Simpson said.

“We know a lot of people struggle to eat healthily because of the cost, but the effort and expense of starting up their own veg garden is too much.

“Once the community garden is fully established, they will be able to use it, and hopefully it will benefit a lot of people.”

They are planning to have the garden finished by early May, and have a fruit swap stall out the front.

This project is partially funded by Moira Shire through the More for Moira initiative.

QUEENSLAND FRUIT FLY COMMUNITY UPDATE

The importance of post harvest hygiene

Queensland Fruit Fly (QFF) hygiene strategies focus on the collection and destruction of susceptible fruit. Fruit left on trees or vines after harvest and fruit on the ground should be harvested and picked up and destroyed before eggs and larvae that may be in them can mature to the pupa stage. QFF larvae leave these fruit and pupate in the ground as fruit rots away. If this is allowed to happen QFF will be almost impossible to manage as pesticides approved for ground application against pupae are difficult to apply and not always 100 per cent effective. There is no pesticide approved for ground application in home gardens.

Fruit left on trees or the ground after harvest is especially susceptible. Following harvest of most fruit, local QFF populations remain in orchards for a week or two before moving on to another site with ripe or ripening fruit. These QFF are desperate to lay eggs as most host fruit has been removed during harvest. Any fruit left will be a target for infestation.

If this fruit become infested and remains on site, or is not destroyed effectively, QFF that eventually emerge will find evergreen plants to take refuge in over the winter or until the next nearby crop ripens. In Victoria QFF overwinters as adult fly and become next season's QFF populations.

Explosion of populations

If for example, 10,000 fruit were produced from a row of small feijoa trees and active QFF control measures were not undertaken, it is quite possible for over 120,000 mature adult QFF to emerge from this fruit over a month. As feijoas are one of the last fruiting plants before the onset of winter, adult QFF may find refuge in surrounding evergreen foliage and survive winter. With 50 per cent of the QFF population female (60,000 in this example) and given each female may lay up to 2,000 eggs in its lifetime these feijoa-bred flies would cause massive problems in the coming season. The following spring, the number of adult flies on the landscape ready to mate would cause a population explosion.

Destroying infested fruit

It is essential to pick up or remove all fruit that is not wanted and destroy it before larvae can leave the fruit and pupate in the ground. Infested fruit containing eggs and larvae can be destroyed by:

- Maceration of fruit (e.g. garden mulcher)
- Solarise fruit by placing in black plastic bags, seal and leave in sun for a week
- Freeze fruit until solid (about 2 days)
- Microwave fruit for 3 to 5 minutes (depending on quantity)
- Run fruit eating animals to clean up fallen fruit – chickens, ducks and guinea fowl eat fallen fruit and scratch out QFF larvae and pupae from the soil.

Numurkah celebrates tyre clearance

THE Numurkah community gathered in Newman Square last Thursday evening to celebrate a momentous event - the completion of the clearance of the notorious tyre stockpile.

The event was hosted by Moira Shire Council, and provided free treats for everybody, including a tyre themed bouncy castle, face painting, snow cones, fairy floss and a barbecue.

One of the most talked about attractions was a cake in the shape of a stack of tyres, made by Numurkah Bakery & Café's Les Bannon, which, despite many jokes that it was a bit rubbery, was as delicious as it was visually stunning.

Representatives from all of the agencies involved in the clearance operation were on hand, and speeches commemorating the clearance

were made by Mayor Libro Mustica, Tyrecycle CEO Jim Fairweather, and acting north east region manager for the EPA, Jessica Bandiera.

Whilst each speaker acknowledged the efforts of all of the agencies involved, and hailed the clearance as the result of great teamwork between them, Cr Mustica made special mention of O'Loughlins Excavations, Johnno Kerrins and Ken Bickham in particular, for their work loading the tyres on site.

Mr Fairweather noted that it took 44 days and 330 truckloads to remove the 5,500 tonnes of tyres, and that the workload had temporarily converted Tyrecycle's Somerton recycling plant from a 10 hour a day operation to 24 hours a day. "Throughout the process, the Somerton plant

received weekly inspections by the EPA to ensure that the tyres were being recycled and not just sitting there and creating a hazard at another site," he said.

"I want to ensure everybody that every single tyre from the Numurkah stockpile has now been shredded and re-purposed."

Whilst all of the tyres from the site may have been re-purposed, two of them haven't actually been shredded.

The EPA's Jessica Bandiera presented Cr Mustica with a tyre from the site, mounted with a plaque expressing the EPA's appreciation for the shire's assistance with the clean-up project. A twin of that memento hangs in the EPA's Melbourne offices.

Katunga Primary School says goodbye to Mrs P

WHEN school resumes at Katunga Primary School next term, there will be one face missing. For the first time in 31 years, prep teacher Lidija Patching - universally known as Mrs P - will not be there to add her special brand of magic, having retired last Friday.

It was an emotional day for Mrs P, as past students, principals, parents and grandparents arrived at the school to bid her farewell.

Bill Stammers, whose children and grandchildren had been taught by Mrs P, told the *Leader* that the whole school community was sad to see her go.

"The whole community loves her - not just the school community but the whole Katunga community," he said.

"My kids were here when she first started and

you couldn't get a better teacher for kids. She's just a joy to be around. It won't be the same without her."

One of those kids is Mr Stammers' son Bud, who is now school council president, and whose children now attend the school, which he agreed won't be the same without her.

"She is this great, warm, funny, matter-of-fact personality and was always such a solid presence here. Katunga's really going to miss her," he said.

Former Katunga PS principals Scott McKenzie and Chris McCallun attended the celebration for the teacher they said had always been a great selling point for the school.

"Her professionalism and nature with the kids has always been excellent, and she was the perfect entry point to school for prep students," Mr

McKenzie said.

Mr McCallun agreed, saying that Mrs P had always been someone who could be relied upon as an excellent teacher across all grade levels.

Current principal Natalie Hopcroft, said that it had made her entry to the school easier, knowing that such an experienced teacher was at the helm in the prep area.

"She is an exceptional operator who has a great rapport with the little ones and is very focussed on the three Rs, and we are definitely going to miss her," she said.

For her part, an emotional Mrs P told the *Leader* that she has enjoyed her years at Katunga immensely.

"In a small school, you really get to know the parents and kids, and I've loved that," she said.

"Being here so long, I've been with some families for generations, teaching kids and then teaching their kids years later. It's been wonderful."

However, despite the accolades and great outpouring of love and admiration from the community, Mrs P was reluctant to take too much credit.

"I've had wonderful colleagues here, and been blessed with great bosses. It would be a hard job if you didn't have the support of good colleagues and families, but the whole community here has made it easy," she said.

"I've enjoyed being the starting point for the kids and seeing their progress. It's always given me a buzz, and I'm going to miss it."

Illegal dumping costs council heaps

ILLEGAL rubbish dumping across the Moira Shire is costing the council up to \$76,000 every year.

That is the type of money that could be going towards new roads or footpaths, but the money isn't going towards anything if people keep illegally dumping their rubbish.

The *Leader* received a report last Tuesday of a pile of domestic rubbish dumped by the roadside at Saxton St West.

The farmer who made the report told the *Lead-er* that it was a sight he saw often on the district's roadsides, and he was sick of it.

"Why can't they just use the tip like everyone else?" he said.

"For the sake of saving a few dollars, they think they can just dump their crap wherever they want. It's selfish and feral."

The farmer told the *Leader* he planned on notifying the council as well, but he hoped that if a photo of the dumped waste was published, it may lead to the waste being recognised and the perpetrators being reported and facing consequences.

Dumping rubbish doesn't only make the community look bad, it brings harm to the wildlife in the area, and can destroy the land it has been dumped on.

General Manager Community Sally Rice said, "This rubbish can threaten wildlife and lead to long term contamination of land, waterways and groundwater, particularly when the rubbish is from an industrial source."

We as a community, need to be aware of this issue and fix it as soon as we can.

"Illegal dumping can range in scale from a single bag of household rubbish to large household items such as televisions, electrical appliances, furniture, mattresses, industrial waste, construction and demolition materials, garden waste, packaging, tyres and even old cars," Ms Rice said.

Illegal dumping isn't taken lightly in the Magistrate's Court, getting caught can cost you up to \$16,000.

The Environment Protection Authority's (EPA) Illegal Dumping Strike Force program has shown that around 33,000 tonnes of illegally dumped rubbish is cleaned up every year in the Moira Shire.

"The dumping of litter in Moira Shire is an offence and, from time to time, our officers have had to clean rubbish from the side of the road, a public reserve or even on a nature strip," Ms Rice said.

EPA clean up notices are legally enforceable orders to remove dumped waste for proper disposal, and EPA fines start in the thousands of dollars and can go as high as hundreds of thousands if the case goes to court.

The EPA encourages residents to call 5871 9222 if you witness any illegal dumping.



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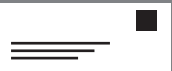

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Irrigators need relief

FIXED water costs must be covered so irrigators in northern Victoria can get back to producing food and fibre, not worrying about how to pay the bills.

Irrigators within the Goulburn Murray irrigation district (GMID) are desperate for bill relief as drought, high water prices and sky-rocketing energy costs put farmers under huge pressure.

Questions I put to the Andrews Government have confirmed concerns that more and more of our irrigators have lost access, or risk losing access, to their water, because they can't afford to pay their bills.

Goulburn Murray Water (GMW) has now placed stop supply orders on 587 customers, with 803 moving to monthly instalment plans already this season – up from 301 in 2016-17, and 539 in 2017-18.

Not only is this bad for irrigators, but it also adds to growing concerns about how viable GMW is.

The Nationals have been calling for shire rate relief for farmers under pressure from drought.

In northern Victoria, the State Government must also step in on behalf of irrigators to cover fixed water costs. We believe this is a practical and immediate step the Andrews Government could take to help farmers who are already struggling with the huge cost of water.

Without urgent support, more of our farms are going to disappear.

VicHealth understands that women shouldn't have to face abuse, shaming, cat-calling and heckling when they choose to get active – whether that's playing AFLW or going

for a walk around the block.

It's why we hosted our first ever This Girl Can Week across Victoria from 18-24 March, a week where women across the state could say 'this week I can', free from judgement and degrading comments.

Over 370 events took place across the state, ranging from canoeing, squash, pickleball, dragon boating, hiking, netball, bowls or group fitness, showing that Victorian women well and truly 'can' do it.

Importantly, the events were inclusive, beginner-friendly and non-judgemental, allowing women to give something new a go or return to an activity in a fun and supportive environment.

We also saw a surge in women sharing their experiences to the #ThisGirlCanVIC community of women, encouraging others to get on board and supporting each other.

Food wasted

NEW research from Sustainability Victoria has revealed that a significant number of foods are being wasted in the state's hospitality sector, while also highlighting an appetite from local food service businesses to minimise wastage across the industry.

To help businesses reduce costs and overcome common barriers to minimising waste, Sustainability Victoria has today announced the launch of Love Food Hate Waste business pilot program, a free Victorian Government program designed to provide practical support to Victorian food service businesses to reduce food wastage.

Minister of energy, environment and climate change, the Hon. Lily D'Ambrosio said the program was an important step towards reducing waste in one of Victoria's most iconic industries.

"We know that our state's hospitality businesses want to minimise food waste to reduce both its financial and environmental impacts.

This accessible, practical program will help them send less waste to landfill and reduce their operating costs," Ms D'Ambrosio said.

As part of the \$500,000 program, businesses will receive simple tools and guidance to identify new ways to prevent food waste.

The program aims to help venues understand where food waste is happening, and offers practical resources, like food waste tracking tools, action plans and online support, to help businesses cut back on food waste.

A separate study, commissioned by Sustainability Victoria, found the state's hospitality community are conscious of the scale of the problem, with more than four in five (85%) businesses surveyed considering food waste to be a significant issue in the Victorian hospitality industry.

In an audit of 195 Victorian hospitality businesses, venues produced an average of 5.6 tonnes of food waste every year.

Of this 5.6 tonnes, approximately 54% of the food waste could have been prevented, amounting in three tonnes per business per year.

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Plans to refresh the Lodge well underway

THE first stage of planning for redeveloping the Numurkah Pioneers Memorial Lodge is currently under way.

Numurkah District Health Service CEO, Jacque Phillips, said NDHS was delighted to release the tenders for the Numurkah Pioneers Memorial Lodge master planning and feasibility study.

The next step involves selecting the most appropriate site and structure for the redevelopment.

The site investigation will consider the existing site or another part of land within the Numurkah District Health Service premises.

Once this is completed, the detailed design phase will take place, followed by the tendering of works and construction.

"Numurkah District Health Service has made a commitment to fund the feasibility study and will use reserves to fund the capital project.

"This commitment will remain in place, regardless of whether Numurkah District Health Service remains a separate organisation, or becomes an amalgamated entity with Nathalia and Cobram," Ms Phillips said.

"We are proud to be funding this major project that will benefit many in our community for years to come," she said.

This week in 1919 ...

To celebrate the State Library of Victoria's digitising of the war years editions of the Numurkah Leader, each week we will include the news of the week, 100 years ago.

The issue of April 9, 1919 is missing from the Trove website, so I have included here an article taken from the previous week's issue, April 2.

NUMURKAH GIRL IN INDIA. SISTER DEVINE WRITES HOME.

Sister Agnes Devine, of the Military Hospital Devali, India, in a letter to her father, (Mr. James Devine, Numurkah) describes a trip which she and another sister had just taken to the Himalaya Mountains, Delhi, Agra and Simla:—"Another sister and I had a month's leave and we decided to visit Delhi, Agra and Simla. We commenced our train journey on 9th December, and spent two days in the train, travelling day and night. The train accommodation in India is rather good; of course, we always travel first-class on concession rates, which means just about half the amount of a first class ticket. Sleeping berths are provided, electric light and fan, and, of course, a dining car. The last 60 miles of our journey was really a wonderful railway. We went to Simla first; went through over a hundred tunnels. They were numbered, and as our train kept climbing higher and higher up, the wind got freezing cold. Simla is over 7000 feet above sea level. Here you see nature in all its rugged grandeur. The beautiful snow-capped Himalayas—some of the finest scenery I have ever seen. We stayed at the Cecil Hotel (considered the best in India), and it is really a fine place. Of course, we had huge fires, as it was freezing cold, but I enjoyed it. Sir and Lady Brett were there.

One day we went for a drive up Jacka Hill, the highest point in Simla. We rode for a good while, and then when the climb got too steep for the natives to pull us, we walked. The snow was lying feet deep, and at the top of Jacka Hill was the home of the monkeys. They look so much nicer in their wild state, and it was rather comical to see them swinging from branch to branch in the trees. One day we were caught in a snowstorm, which was rather a novelty to me, as you can imagine. I never got tired of looking at the snow-capped Himalayas.

Well, we spent eight days at Simla, and then travelled on to Delhi. It was much warmer there, of course, and the country is flat, but still it is rather a fine place. About five miles away they are building a new Delhi. All the buildings are of pure white, and when it is finished it will be a fine city. Delhi is full of tombs, temples and mosques, and we saw the place where all the women and children were killed at the time of the Indian Mutiny. The fort which we visited contains marble palace where the last kings and queens of Delhi lived. We saw the robes and jewels of the last queen, and also many wonderful and interesting things. We visited the ivory palace, and saw the natives at work carving the ivory. I bought one little piece: it cost me 10 rupees. The gardens were very nice. There is a monument there to John Nicholson, who was killed at the time of the mutiny. We met several sisters at Delhi, who came out with us on the Canberra.

After spending a very enjoyable time at Delhi we travelled on to Agra. It, too, is very historical and the fort there is even better than at Delhi. We went through it. On New Year's Day a party of us motored to Fatepur Sikra, a distance of 25 miles. It was well worth seeing. But, of course, the chief sight in Agra is the Taj Mahal. It is one of the seven wonders of the world; built 400 years ago by Emperor Shah Jehan in memory of his wife. Their tombs are both inside. It is built of solid white marble, and is in parts inlaid with precious stones. Inside the tomb there is a beautiful lamp, presented by Lord Curzon. The Taj Mahal cost three million pounds without the labor, and took seventeen years to build. There it stands in all its snowy whiteness, surrounded by beautiful gardens with fountains playing in front and a river at the back, the most beautiful thing I have ever seen. To see it in the evening it really looks like a dream building, and one is afraid it might vanish away. It had a fascination for me, and I went to see it about seven times, and was not tired of it then.

Well we are back at work again now in the hospital, where I suppose we will be for a few months, and then to dear old Australia and home.

Donation full of heart for NDHS

A RECENT donation to Numurkah District Health Service (NDHS) has proved, once again, that volunteer groups are the heart of our community.

NDHS has recently purchased a brand new electrocardiogram (ECG) machine, thanks to a generous donation of \$6,000 - which covered half of the machine's cost - from Heartbeat Victoria Inc's Goulburn Valley branch.

Heartbeat is a peer to peer support group for people with heart conditions, and their family and friends.

Since it formed in 1986, the GV branch has donated over \$200,000 towards cardiac and emergency equipment and services for the benefit of people in the Goulburn Valley.

One of the group's founding members, Ian Waser, was from Numurkah, and there have been many members from Numurkah district over the years.

GV Heartbeat secretary Robyn Fennell said that, when the group heard that Numurkah needed a new ECG machine, it made perfect sense for them to chip in.

"We try and direct our donations to where we see a need, and it's important that Numurkah has a functioning ECG machine so that local people don't have to travel to access that service," she said.

ECG machines measure heart rhythm, and look at the heart in various ways to help diagnose a range of heart conditions.

NDHS director of clinical services Wendy Ross said that Heartbeat's donation towards the new machine was a huge help.

"Our old machine was in need of repair and was getting unreliable due to age," she said.

"Obviously, replacing it was a priority for us, but medical equipment is extremely expensive. To have a group come forward and say 'here, we will cover half of the cost' is just wonderful.

"This new machine will be hugely beneficial to our patients and staff."

GV Heartbeat raises funds through various means throughout the year, including Bunnings barbecues, can collection drives, and participation in the organisation's annual statewide raffle. Direct donations are always welcome.

Locals to shine like superstars

THE original rock opera, Jesus Christ Superstar, is being bought back to the stage by Shepparton Theatre Arts Group (STAG), and two Numurkah locals will be on hand to help give the classic a modern twist.

It will be the third time STAG has presented Jesus Christ Superstar over the years, but this production promises to be very different from its previous interpretations.

The show's director Trish Deacon told the *Leader* that, whilst the company's previous productions of the show were fairly faithful to the original's biblical setting, the setting for this production is much more of our times.

"It's very industrial and grungy looking, which is about bringing the show to audiences in a contemporary setting that they can relate to," she said.

"The show is so well known to audiences, which is what keeps them coming back to see it, but by changing the setting we can perhaps get them to think about the plot slightly differently."

The script, and world famous songs created by Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice, are timeless and remain unchanged, but with the original production debuting on Broadway in 1971 - almost 50 years ago - there is a solid argument for giving it an updated look.

Cassandra Willis and Samantha Gierveld, who are both teachers at Numurkah Secondary College, are appearing in the production, and agree that audiences will be impressed by the set and staging.

"It's a really interesting and interactive set, and we are really looking forward to acting in it and seeing audiences reactions," Ms Willis said.

Although this is the first STAG production for both of them, Ms Willis and Ms Gierveld are both long-time fans of, and participants in, musical theatre, and are also both huge Jesus Christ Superstar fans.

"I was really excited when I heard they were doing Jesus Christ Superstar, because it is one of my favourites and I love the music, so I knew I had to audition," Ms Gierveld said.

Both women are also excited by the chance to play multiple roles in the production, and agree that, whilst it is a challenge to play completely different characters within one play, it is a fun one.

"I play six different roles ranging from an angel to a prostitute, so you have to think about how to inhabit each character, and remind yourself of that," Ms Willis said.

"So I'll think 'I need to be angelic now, or I need to be sleazy now' and perform accordingly."

Ms Gierveld portrays a slightly less hectic three characters, but hers also have vastly different motivations.

"I play an apostle for most of my time on stage, so in that character I'm very supportive of Jesus and quite in thrall of him," she said.

"But I also play a member of a mob calling for Jesus' crucifixion, so I need to be able to demonstrate that mindset too."

Cast and crew have been rehearsing since February, and Ms Deacon said it is progressing very well.

"The songs and choreography have all been learned, so it's just a matter of perfecting them now and of all the performers really developing the nuances of each character."

It might sound like a big ask, but Ms Willis is adamant that it is fun, and that the performers are well supported in their endeavours.

"There is a huge team working on it together - the cast are just the ones that audiences see on the night," she said.

"There is a huge ensemble of talented people, with so many different jobs, working together to create something that's going to be really wonderful, and I can't wait for people to see it."

NUMURKAH locals looking to get out of the house and do something new now have the chance to do just that with three new activity programs kicking off in town.

A new program called UCAN - which stands for Unlimited Choice of Activities Now - aims to tackle social isolation by offering diverse activities to cater for a range of different tastes.

In the past week, Numurkah senior citizens centre has hosted the first sessions of a new monthly book club, and drumbeats - a djembe drumming program which will run for eight weeks.

A weekly dancing program will begin in May.

Sam Spinks, Primary Care Connect (PCC) health promotion officer who is responsible for UCAN, said that anybody who missed the first session of either program, but would still like to join, is more than welcome.

"We're just getting started, so new participants can definitely still join in without fear of being behind," she said.

UCAN is funded through PCC's gambler's help program, in recognition of the fact that research has shown that social disconnection makes people more susceptible to vulnerable behaviours such as gambling.

Ms Spinks said that reaching people suffering social isolation is challenging, so the program aims to draw them out and engage them with things that interest them.

"It can be hard to reach into the community and find those people. We are hoping that by providing them with interesting options that may appeal to them, and removing barriers such as cost and accessibility, they might come out and join in and make some valuable social connections in their communities.

"It's a preventative program, so we won't be bombarding people with information, but we'll be letting them know information is there if they want it. We are really hoping just to help people build connections and interests, and, through those, skills

Activities are being run across Moira, Mitchell, Murrindindi and Strathbogie Shires and the City of Greater Shepparton, with activities for each location being chosen through community surveys.

"We created shortlists according to the survey results, and tailored activities to the communities, bearing in mind what was already being provided."

The first drumbeats session was held on Monday, with a diverse range of participants.

Facilitator Julie Trotter took participants through some basic techniques, encouraging them to put beats together as they saw fit.

Ms Trotter said the program was designed so that anyone can enjoy it.

"Drumming is something quite different for most people, so it might take you out of your comfort zone, but it is actually an easy way to create something and it's very satisfying because of that," she said.

"Music creates moods and atmospheres, and talking about rhythm gives you a chance to reflect on the rhythms of life, and we talk about that a little bit.

"In a group setting like this, you employ teamwork to create a sound and a mood, and everyone gets something out of it individually as well."

Participant Les Addison, aged 79, attended with his son Adam, and said he saw it as a chance to try something different.

"Sometimes it's not until you retire that you realise how much you are missing out on, so now that I have the time, I'm interested in trying new things," he said.

"You might as well try everything you can because you never know what you might really enjoy, and this has been different and fun."

Hamilton snares win in first race of season

BEN Hamilton can clearly remember the moment he fell hook, line and sinker for motor racing. His dad had taken him to Winton to see the V8 Supercars when he was 12, his first experience of live motor racing, and he was a goner.

"Dad and his family were always into cars, and I had watched a lot of it on TV, but being there was next level," he said.

"The smell of the fumes and the rubber, and the sheer pace of it. I knew straight away that's what I wanted out of life."

Fast-forward 11 years, and Ben has just taken first place in the first round of the Victorian Pulsar Racing Series, part of the Australian Pulsar Racing Association circuit, for 2019.

Having finished third overall in last year's championship, Ben went into the latest event, held at Sandown on the first weekend in March, hoping to continue his good form, and maybe score a place - any place - on the podium.

"Over the course of the weekend I scored a first and two thirds through the three races, and that was

enough to take out first place. It was really exciting."

The races are sprints, lasting approximately 30 minutes. Most races are a distance between 30-40 kilometres.

Not bad for a bloke going into just his fourth season, who started late in his first as a complete novice against drivers who had been in the game for a decade.

"It was an uphill battle at the start, with no experience, but I'm really into it now and feeling pretty good about my skill," he said.

"I feel like I can really compete for podium position every round and take top spot at the end of the season if I can get to the races."

It's getting to the races that's the issue.

Motor racing is an expensive hobby, and no matter how skilled you are, if you can't pay the entry fees - which are the major expense - you can't race. As a retail worker, Ben isn't exactly rolling in cash.

Ben, who lives in Numurkah and works in Cobram, is lucky enough to have a few Cobram businesses as loyal sponsors, but unfortunately

it's not enough.

"I've been really lucky with my sponsors, and I'm so grateful to them because I wouldn't have gotten this far without them.

"My employers, Artavilla's Emporium, are a sponsor, along with In Tune Auto, Vurgel Precision Auto, Cobram Hire and Better Home Living. They've been really good to me but it's not quite enough.

"I can't win the season if I don't make it onto the grid for all of the other four races, and I'm not sure I can make that happen unless someone else backs me."

With such a strong start to the season, that would be a shame.

However, Ben won't be saying die any time soon.

"I know I've got the right car underneath me to win if I can get there, and if I can get a little bit more help then I know it's possible. "I'm definitely not giving up now."

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ABS releases population stats

THIS year represented the 20th anniversary of Harmony Day, which embraces inclusiveness, respect and belonging for all Australians, regardless of cultural or linguistic background.

To celebrate this milestone, the Australian Bureau of Statistics has gone through its 2016 census data to put together a statistical snapshot of who we are as a nation.

This is what they found:

Australia's First Peoples

In 2016, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people represented 2.8% of the population - up from 2.5% in 2011, and 2.3% in 2006.

Of the 649,200 people who identified as being of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander origin in 2016, 91% were of Aboriginal origin, 5.0% were of Torres Strait Islander origin and 4.1% identified as being of both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander origin.

The median age for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people is rising. In 1996, the median age was 20. By 2011 this had increased to 21 years, and increased again to 23 years in the five years to 2016. This compares with a median age of 38 for non-indigenous people.

One in 10 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people reported speaking an Australian indigenous language at home in the 2016 census. Of the 63,800 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who spoke an indigenous language at home, 85% reported speaking English well or very well.

Country of birth

The 2016 census shows that two thirds (67%) of the Australian population were born in Australia. Of the 6,163,667 people born overseas, nearly one in five (18%) had arrived since the start of 2012.

While England (14.7%) and New Zealand (8.4%) were still the next most common countries of birth after Australia, the proportion of those born overseas who were born in China and India has increased since 2011 (from 6.0% to 8.3% and 5.6% to 7.4% respectively).

The next most common countries of birth after England, New Zealand, China and India were the Philippines (3.8%); Vietnam (3.6%); Italy (2.8%); South Africa (2.6%); Malaysia (2.2%) and Scotland (1.9%).

As of 2015, Australia had the ninth largest number of overseas-born people, higher than both Spain (10th) and Italy (11th). While the United States of America had the highest total number of people born overseas (47 million or 14% of their population), Australia had a higher proportion of overseas-born people, at 26%. Australia also had a higher proportion of people born overseas than New Zealand (23%) and Canada (22%).

Our ancestries

Over 300 ancestries - the cultural group that a person most closely identifies with - were identified in the 2016 census. The most commonly reported ancestries were English (36%) and Australian (34%).

These were followed by Irish (11.0%); Scottish (9.3%); Chinese (5.6%); Italian (4.6%); German (4.5%); Indian (2.8%); Greek (1.8%) and Dutch (1.6%).

Languages

In 2016, there were over 300 separately identified languages spoken in Australian homes. More than one-fifth (21%) of Australians spoke a language other than English at home.

After English, Mandarin remained the next most commonly spoken language (2.5% of the total population) followed by Arabic (1.4%) and Vietnamese and Cantonese (both 1.2%).

Religion

In 2016, Christianity was the main religion reported in Australia (52%).

After Christianity, the second largest religion was Islam (2.6%), closely followed by Buddhism (2.4%).

The count of people who reported 'no religion' increased to almost a third of the Australian population between 2011 and 2016 (22% to 30%).

Cottage cross industry fills parish coffers

IT'S almost Palm Sunday, and that means one thing for Numurkah and Nathalia Anglican parishioners - it's time to make crosses from palm leaves for the benefit of the parish's bank account.

For the past month, around a dozen dedicated parishioners have been busily creating crosses out of palm leaves, which the parish uses to fill orders from around Australia, as happens every year.

Parish secretary Lou Hamon, who is responsible for the administration and posting, said that this fund raising activity has been happening for around five years, since it was suggested by former rector Kim Benton.

"It's an excellent fundraiser for the parish as there is no outlay for us except our time," he said.

"Generous locals with palm trees donate the fronds, and the parishioners use them to make the crosses."

Lou sends out emails with order forms to the previous year's customers each January, and other customers contact the parish through its website.

"We have a record number of orders this year, with quite a few new groups getting in touch with us, for a total of 9,283 crosses ordered," Lou said.

Orders range in size, with one order for just 38 crosses this year, and two orders for 1,000 crosses, whilst most orders are in the hundreds.

With crosses retailing for 66 cents each, and purchasers paying postage, the parish stands to make over \$6,000 from the enterprise.

Lou confirms that it's a nice little earner for the parish.

"It's a busy few weeks for us, but it is a wonderful fund raiser and does make a big difference to our finances each year."

While Lou is busy counting, packing and posting the crosses, other parishioners, including Ian and Bev Patrick, are busy making them.

When the *Leader* caught up with the Patricks last Friday, they had already made well over a thousand crosses between them, and were busy producing more.

Ian said that before they start making the crosses, they cut leaves off the fronds and wipe them down to make sure they are clean.

"Then it's fold, fold cut," he said.

Whilst Ian and Bev have slightly different folding methods, and there is slight speculation as to whose method is best - Bev's is quicker, but Ian's produces a tighter cross - they both agree that they are happy when the job is finished for another year.

"You do get a bit sick of it after a while, but it is only a few weeks a year, and it is well worth it for the parish," she said.

An infraction against the Purples gave Cobram a free kick, a simple goal, and in the end, the game.

Though the 10.7.67 to 11.14.80 loss wasn't how Nathalia would have liked to see the footballing year start off, it wasn't all doom and gloom as a number of Nathalia players stood up and put in impressive shifts.

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
