

Busy week for thieves and vandals across district

A NUMBER of incidents involving thefts and damage have occurred across the district over the past week.

A Dolphin Street resident was only away from his property for an hour on Monday when they came home to find that the security and front door has been damaged.

A Skoda sedan which was parked in the driveway has had both passenger doors kicked in, causing an extensive damage bill.

Another Numurkah couple returned home from a weekend away to find that their Collis St home had been egged.

A Pine Road resident has found his Ford sedan door open and

the vehicle ransacked. A battery charger and an LED headlight with a total value of \$160 were stolen from the vehicle.

The electric cabling to the automated gates of a Betts Road residence has been cut, disabling the system, but nothing is believed to have been stolen.

The residents of a property at Spences Road Katunga weren't so lucky, as a number of items were stolen from the rear of their home.


The items included a set of Stanley spanners wrapped in a black roll-out style folder with the Stanley brand in yellow on the front and a hydraulic trolley jack.

At least \$1,000 damage was done when the glass front door of Nathalia Hair & Beauty was smashed sometime between midnight and 2.30am last Saturday.

Owner Leanne Pell said that though no entry was gained to the shop, the glass pane will cost around \$1,000 to be replaced, including sign writing.

A window of another business nearby is believed to have been damaged at the same time.

A 25 year-old Numurkah resident was lucky to receive only minor injuries when the vehicle she was driving left the Murray Valley Hwy at Cobram and collided with a tree on Saturday.

Hazmat scare at primary school

WHAT had been an otherwise quiet week for local fire brigades took a turn yesterday with the report of a strong smell of gas at Numurkah Primary School (NPS).

The school's business manager Ann Shephard told the Leader that she called emergency services at around 9.15am after noticing a strong smell of gas outside the

school, at both the front and rear of the main building.

"The students were all inside, so the office staff closed all of the external doors and we let the teachers know to keep all of the students inside," she said.

"The fire brigade and police arrived quickly, but by the time they got here the smell had dissipated. It

was really strong and noticeable for around 15 minutes though."

The Numurkah fire brigade waited at the school for members from Shepparton to attend with gas detection equipment.

The area around the school tested negative for gas, with a fire brigade spokesperson saying that it was likely that gas had drifted into the

area overnight.

The only other local call-out for the week occurred at 4.30pm Monday, when Kaarimba brigade was called to a reported scrub fire in Kaarimba Rd.

The fire was actually in Moss Road and was a pile of sticks being burnt. No action was required by the fire brigade.

Week of weather ups and downs ahead

AFTER shivering through an especially cold weekend just gone, the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) is forecasting a much warmer outlook this weekend - but it has warned it won't last.

The cold westerly winds we've recently been treated to will give way to a much more civilised northerly over the next few days, bringing temperatures to match.

The mercury will gradually climb as high as the week progresses, with a top of 17° forecast for Thursday, but a slightly chillier Friday, with morning showers possible and a top of 15°.

However, the weekend looks set to make up for it with Saturday likely to reach 18° after a chilly start, and the potential for Sunday to see a high of 20°.

Unfortunately, the fun looks set to be well and truly over by Monday, when the westerlies return with a wintry blast, driving temperatures back down to the low teens.

Rain will come with the low temperatures early in the week, with north east and south west parts of Victoria set to get as much as 20mm.

Meanwhile Alpine areas won't be getting all that much of a reprieve, with icy winds of 70-80 kilometres per hour expected over the weekend and into the start of next week.

Councils seek deferral of local govt reforms

THE Municipal Association of Victoria's (MAV) has expressed concern about the State's process and lack of detail in new Local Government Bill reforms.

In a submission to the government regarding the reforms, the MAV said the State's process and lack of detail, has prevented meaningful consultation on significant reforms that could have negative consequences for communities.

The MAV has called on the Victorian Government to defer the proposed reforms for 12-18 months to enable full examination of the issues including costs, community impacts and other unintended consequences.

Two proposed reforms - mandated single member wards and community-initiated Commissions of Inquiry - are of greatest concern to MAV, as they could fundamentally shift the nature of council governance. The MAV said they are significant proposals that warrant further detailed examination.

The MAV is also concerned about a third reform, the voter franchise, as it means non-resident ratepayers would no longer be automatically enrolled to vote in council elections.

In the 2016 council elections, an estimated 620,000 people - 14% of all voters - were non-resident ratepayers. The State reform pro-

poses to require these ratepayers to apply to go on the electoral roll before each election.

The MAV has provided support or in-principle support for a number of proposed reforms including:

- a prohibition on foreign donations to local government candidates, a reduction in the gift disclosure threshold, and for councils to have a gift register and gift policy;

- mandatory candidate training;
- prescribed standards of conduct, a formal internal arbitration process, and disqualification of a councillor for repeated serious misconduct; and

- mayoral and councillor allowances to be set by the Independent Remuneration Tribunal.

MAV president Cr Coral Ross said further meaningful consultation was needed on proposed new reforms through release of a publicly available Local Government Bill 2019 Exposure Draft and draft regulations.

"When the State announced new reforms in June, there had been no public process to inform the government's proposals and no available modelling outlining their rationale or the community impacts," Ms Ross said.

"We want to see the new reform proposals deferred while proper consultation is undertaken."



Mapping Numurkah's soldier settlement history

THREE local community groups have been working hard on a project that goes to the very heart of Numurkah's history - mapping our town's soldier settlement program.

The soldier settlement memorial project is a joint initiative of the Rotary Club of Numurkah, Numurkah and District Historical Society and Numurkah RSL sub-branch.

The project aims to provide an accurate map of the soldier settlement scheme blocks around Numurkah, and after many months of work a map and list of families who occupied the blocks has been created.

The scheme in the local area was initiated in 1947, and in just a few years took the township of Numurkah's population from the 1,600 residents it had at the end of the war in 1945 to 2,200 residents in 1951.

Although a figure is unavailable, the population of Numurkah Shire, including, as it did, many new farms, would have experienced even greater growth.

The rapid population growth created a corresponding growth in infrastructure. Numurkah primary school temporarily expanded to become a P-12 college, until Numurkah gained its first official high school in 1957 on part of the site occupied by the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission on Toomul Road.

With 395 dairy farm blocks of around 100 acres each, and 113 orchard blocks of around 50 acres each created by the scheme, the rapid population growth is not surprising.

Though many of the farms and orchards created by the scheme are no longer operating, at the time, the scheme was hugely successful.

- unlike similar schemes attempted after World War 1, when many soldier settlers ended up walking off the land.

Though the concept of both schemes were largely the same, there was one major difference between them - water.

In 1947, alongside the soldier settlement scheme, work on the Murray Valley Irrigation District (MVID) began in earnest.

Whilst the MVID had been proclaimed in 1938 and the Yarrawonga weir and main irrigation channels developed, work on the MVID largely ground to a halt once Australia entered the war in 1939.

With Numurkah the administrative base of the scheme, a large number of army huts were transported to the town to house workers on the irrigation scheme, single men who had been granted a soldier settlement lease, and married men whose families would join them once accommodation was available on their new properties.

Having grown up on a soldier settlement block, the project has special significance to Stephen Mills, who is a member of both Rotary and the historical society and has been working on the mapping project.

Mr Mills told the *Leader* that the government was determined that the scheme be successful.

"They really wanted to make sure that the soldier settlers stayed on their farms, so they paid them each a wage of four pounds per week until their farm became productive," he said.

The soldier settlers were also offered loans with very generous terms to purchase their farm blocks.

"It cost about £8,000 for a 100 acre dairy block and they paid 2.5% interest with 55 years to pay, which was basically their lifetime, but to get a loan they weren't allowed to have any other assets" Mr Mills said.

Though the terms may have been generous, other conditions were far from ideal.

The 100 acres came in the form of one block with no infrastructure. Though a few of the blocks had houses on them, most didn't even have fences, let alone dairies.

The first building on most of the blocks was a two-room galvanised iron garage which settlers were expected to live in until a house was built. Due to post-war shortages of materials such as cement and iron, the garages were sometimes old transportable army sheds.

Men worked in teams laying out the farms one at a time, establishing pastures and planting trees while pre-fabricated houses were specially created by Clements-Langford in their Numurkah factory.

"That all took time, so some families couldn't live in their own houses for quite a while," Mr Mills said.

Still, all of that building activity and sudden population growth was good for the local economy.

Lou Cook from the historical society is one of many locals who believe that the scheme is what prevented Numurkah becoming a skeleton village like so many other small Victorian towns.

"Numurkah was a frontier town at the time. There was no recession in Numurkah in the 1950s," he said.

"Between the irrigation works and the soldier settlement blocks and the people coming to town to

work in the service industries created by the scheme, Numurkah was thriving."

Though not all of the soldier settlement farms lasted, those families and properties became part of the fabric of the town, and those working on the mapping project feel that it is time they were recognised for their contribution to the district.

After months of work on the mapping project, Stephen Mills feels confident that an accurate map and corresponding list of family names has been created, and is asking locals who were part of the scheme to help validate it.

"If anybody was part of the scheme we'd really like them to come down to the historical society and have a look at the map and the list and let us know if it's right," he said.

"If anybody has any photos, from any stage of the scheme across the decades, we'd really love to have access to them too."

There is another vital element of the project that is yet to start, and volunteers are being sought to take part.

"We are looking at doing interviews of people who were part of the scheme, or remember those times in the district, to create a recorded oral history that people will be able to access," Mr Mills said.

"It would be great if people could get in touch to take part, or be prepared to have their story recorded if we approach them."

"It's a really vital part of our town and district's history and we want to preserve it for future generations."



By special advertisement in this issue Arch-Priest McCarthy invites the general public to witness the laying of the foundation stones at 3 o'clock.

The Peace Grant.—At yesterday's meeting of the shire council, it was agreed to accede to the Numurkah peace celebrations committee to spend up to £100 on any demonstration that may be decided upon.

Teachers' Union.—A meeting of district teachers was held in the Numurkah State-school on Saturday last for the purpose of forming a branch of the Teachers' Union. Mr Calder was elected President, and Mr McBurney secretary. The President and secretary were chosen to represent the branch at the Conference to be held in Melbourne during show week. The following motion was agreed to unanimously:—"That this meeting unanimously protests against any further delay in increasing the salaries of Victorian State-school teachers, and it respectfully begs that they be brought into line with the New South Wales scale, so that teachers may devote their efforts to the education of their pupils instead of watching for any opportunity to leave the department for more lucrative positions."

NATHALIA.

The local branch of the Returned Soldiers' Association has been presented with a very fine Australian flag by Messrs Muntz Bros, and Mr V. Gray has provided the necessary pole. Both gifts are very much appreciated.

It may be of advantage to some folk to know that a post office has been re-opened at Barwo, Mr A C Palmer, M.H.R., having interested himself in the matter.

The office is at the residence of Mr M T. Fairman, and Miss Mary Fairman is the post-mistress.

Some time ago it was proposed even if not carried into effect—to make some miles of the Broken Creek a sanctuary for wild fowl. But sanctuary or not, I know of several residents on the creek frontage who faithfully reject the game laws, and as far as they are able encourage wild duck and other water fowl to find haven. I also know of other residents who make it a practice to tour the creek periodically during the close season and shoot all wild fowl that comes under their ken. It takes all sorts to make up a world of men—law makers, law inspectors, and law breakers.

The 240 litre wheelie bin, a small kitchen caddy and a roll of compostable bags will be delivered mid August for stage one of the rollout and mid September for stage two of the rollout.

St Joe's celebrates founder's feast

As head of the Josephite order of nuns in Australia, Mary MacKillop founded many schools, including St Joseph's Numurkah.

St Joseph's was the first school Mary founded in Victoria, and she officially opened it in 1890.

Each year the school holds a day-long celebration during the week of her feast day on August 8.

The day included Mass, classroom activities focussed on St Mary MacKillop and a barbecue lunch.

At the end of Mass each year on the feast day celebration two students from each class are pre-

sented with a St Mary MacKillop Award.

The award is given to students who signify the qualities lived and promoted by Mary MacKillop, and encapsulated in the quotes 'Never see a need without doing something about it', and 'Always helping and supporting the needs of others.'

Families and friends gathered in the school's MacKillop Centre to see the awards presented, and it was hard to tell who had the biggest smiles - the award recipients, or their proud parents.

This year the awards were presented by Mrs Virginia Woodgate and Fr Michael Grace.

Virginia has a close connection with St Joseph's. She has been a parent and is now a grandmother of children who attend the school as well as being a past staff member and active Parish member.

St Joseph's principal Paul Arnell said it was a really special celebration.

"It's a lovely way to recognise those students who show care and concern towards others," he said.

PREMIERSHIP players from 1979 and 1999 swelled the home crowd for Numurkah's game against Deni Rams on Saturday.

Coach of the 1979 side, Shane Sexton, was interviewed by John Byrnes, who played in the side, during the official proceedings and lunch.

Sexton spoke about how he came to the club from Shepparton United and the total support he received from the committee on his plans for recruitment and

playing personnel. One of the more interesting stories he told concerned winger, Ken Norton, who was on holidays at the time of the first semi-final. In what would have been quite a sensation at the time, the club flew Ken back so he could take his part in the game. The grand final victory came against a strong Berrigan side which went on to win the flag the following year. Rob "Chips" Macartney, the coach in 1999, spoke about his time at the club, recalling the development of young local players as crucial to the success. He also mentioned the unlucky players who missed out. While Macartney also spoke

about his involvement at Hawthorn in player development, he kept coming back to his love of the Numurkah club and country football's closeness and sense of community.

The 1999 triumph came against Saturday's opponent, Deniliquin Rams, as did the 2000 flag, the Blues most recent. The Rams hit back to win the next four.

As part of the festivities, current player Shane Miller was presented with a jumper celebrating his 200th senior games for the club.

Following the senior game, a very successful auction was held for jumpers bearing the names of the three premiership teams.

Numurkah gives Rams the Blues

WITH plenty to play for after a loss to Tungamah, the Numurkah seniors came to play against Deniliquin.

Jarrod Holmes, Kye Roberts and Josh O'Dwyer worked tirelessly at ground level, applying tremendous pressure to keep the ball in the Blues' forward half, setting the standard in tackling across the board.

"Kye needed a good game and as a first year senior player stood up when called upon," his coach said.

The Blues continued to be relentless throughout the second half, with the midfield dictating play, as Mitch Price and Paul Collins continually gave the runners first use of the football.

The younger brigade running through the wings provided crucial support when the chance arose.

The Blues' backline once again displayed a united effort keeping the Rams to two goals for the match and scoreless after the main break.

Grant Gallus nullified any Rams' attempt to go forward and set up the rebound of the back six. His ball use was excellent in a return to his early season form.

SHANE "Wiggy" Miller has achieved many things in a long career in football, but hasn't yet tasted the ultimate glory.

The 33 year old Numurkah veteran played his 200th senior game for the Blues on Saturday, being arguably his team's best player in a resounding win.

Having started his career as a back pocket, Miller has returned to defence this season, following a number of years as a midfielder and winger. His run off half back has been a crucial ingredient in Numurkah's rise up the ladder.

Shane played all his junior football with Lara in the Geelong Football League, highlighted by making the under 16 representative team for the league. He appeared in two grand finals for Lara juniors, for two losses.

most influence on my footy," Shane said. Miller returned to the Geelong area for a couple of years, playing in another losing grand final with Bellarine Football League club, Torquay, in 2012 and picking up a club best and fairest with Belmont in the Geelong & District Football League in 2013.

He also had a couple of years out of the game. On his return to Numurkah, he was part of the losing 2017 team against Nathalia.

"Obviously, premierships aren't that easy to win (unless you're from Nathalia)," Shane quipped.

Miller has previously captained the Blues, coached the fourths and is currently co-coaching the struggling reserves.

"We won't spend too much time on the last one," he said.

Commenting on the Blues 2019 season, Shane said "The team is playing really well and looking forward to finals, with a few players coming back."


"Personally, I have had a good season so far, with no major injuries."
