Amalgamated health service now a reality

THE much-debated amalgamation of Numurkah, Nathalia and Cobram health services is now a reality, with the new NCN Health having come into effect on Monday, July 1.

Minister for Health Jenny Mikakos announced the formation of the new health service last Thursday.

Making the announcement, the Minister said that hospitals in Nathalia, Cobram and Numurkah are coming together as one to share resources and deliver the best healthcare for locals in the Moira Shire.

"This ensures people living in these towns have greater access to the services they need, now and into the future," she said.

The State Government has provided \$175,000 in transition support funding to facilitate the merger.

A statement from the Department of Health and

Human Services reiterated previous assertions that there will be no change to services or staff, who will also continue to work in their current roles. Volunteers at the hospitals will also remain with each campus.

All three hospital campuses will stay and keep their names, and community advisory groups will be created at each campus to ensure community input on local health needs.

Jacque Phillips, who has been CEO of each of the three individual services for around 18 months, will remain in the position of CEO of the amalgamated service.

Ms Phillips told the *Leader* that the boards of the three services were delighted with the announcement.

"The amalgamation of the three services will allow

us to provide sustainable, high quality health care across the three communities into the future," she said.

"Opportunities for growth will be explored and we will be listening very closely to the community advisory groups regarding emerging health needs and working to meet those needs as NCN Health."

Ms Phillips insisted that for now, it is business as usual.

"There will no change to services or service delivery," she said.

"The three services have been closely working together in partnership for some time to deliver safe, high quality care to our communities and that will continue."

Pioneers Lodge redevelopment planning begins

PLANNING for the redevelopment of Numurkah Pioneers Memorial Lodge is under way, with the master plan and feasibility study tender recently awarded to Bamford Architects.

A user group, which includes community members and staff, has also been established.

Numurkah District Health Service (NDHS) CEO, Jacque Phillips described it as an exciting project for the community.

"We are delighted that the Lodge redevelopment project has commenced," she said.

"The entire project including master planning, feasibility study and redevelopment stages will include extensive consultation over the coming months with residents, families, staff, volunteers and involvement of the broader community."

"The master plan and feasibility study process is expected to take six months and will focus on the needs and preferences of consumers, now and in the future; the site options and opportunities, latest design, structure, development guidelines, the character of the local area and other considerations."

The architect has visited the site to look at the existing facility and start exploring site options. Site investigation will consider the existing site and other land within the Numurkah District Health Service grounds.

Once this is completed the feasibility study will take place. The master plan and feasibility study will provide valuable information for the future of aged care services locally, and construction of new facilities.

Numurkah District Health Service will use reserves to fund the capital project.

"We are proud that this project is self-funded," Ms Phillips said.

The user group has been established to provide input and guidance on the project from various levels of expertise and viewpoints and to explore other high standard regional facilities that will inform design opportunities, best practice and models of care.

"The group is already providing valuable input into the project," Ms Phillips said.

Information on the project will be available on the NDHS website www.ndhs.org.au, and facebook page, via newsletters, local media, letters and meetings with residents/families.

A community information and consultation session will be held on Friday, July 26, at 11am at Numurkah District Health Service.

"The three services have been closely working together in partnership for some time to deliver safe, high quality care to our communities and that will continue.

"By working together as an amalgamated service we can attract new funding and new services locally and every opportunity will be taken to maximise services."

Ms Phillips said the new board of directors will spend the next six to 12 months creating a strategic plan to take the new service forward.

The NCN Health board of directors, which will be made up of 12 members, was approved by the Governor in Council last Tuesday.

The board features representatives for each of the three health services, with four members each from Numurkah and Cobram, and three members from Nathalia.

Susan Logie, former chair of the Nathalia Health board, and former Cobram Health chair Dale Brooks both return as board members, however former NDHS board chair Michael

Buha did not apply for membership of the NCN Health board.

The inaugural directors for NCN Health are Dale Brooks, Patricia West, Kade Beasley, Jennifer Gould, Mewan Dissan, Susan Logie, Christopher McCallum, Nathan Morris, Andrew Lelliott, Melissa Nicoll, Kate Hodge and Suni Campbell.

A spokesperson for the Department of Health and Human Services told the *Leader* there were 17 applications, from across the local area and broader region, for membership of the NCN Health board.

"The new NCN Health board has representation from each community, and its membership ensures a balanced mix of professional skills, experience and qualifications and provides continuity to support the transition to NCN Health," they said.

Suni Campbell is the only member of the NCN Health board that has not previously served on the board of one of the three health services.

"NCN Health will also establish a community advisory committee for each of Numurkah, Nathalia and Cobram communities to ensure strong local representation for each of the communities.

"The community advisory committees will be advertised later this month and we encourage all locals to apply."

The department's statement said that extensive consultation and communication with all communities will continue.

Despite heavy criticism having been levelled at the quality and quantity of community consultation prior to the amalgamation, CEO Jacque Phillips concurred with the department's statement.

"Consulting with service users and stakeholders is fundamental to what we do, and NCN Health will not be moving away from that philosophy."

This includes through the Peace and Prosperity Kitchen Garden program at Government House, where the Governor and Mr Howard have fostered friendship and understanding among women of migrant and refugee backgrounds who are newly arrived in Victoria.

Ms Dessau said it is an honour and privilege to represent and promote our great state, and help to celebrate and support Victoria's diverse and vibrant community.

"My husband Tony and I are delighted to be asked to continue our service to the people of Victoria,"

she said.

The Governor and Mr Howard also play significant roles in celebrating the diversity and achievements of the Victorian community through hosting events at Government House, lending their support to major events across the state, and by touring regional communities.

The Governor has also provided outstanding leadership and compassion during some of Victoria's most challenging times, including in the aftermath of the Bourke Street attack in January 2017, and as the Patron for the 10 Year Anniversary of the 2009 Bushfires.

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

Wild weather keeps SES busy and stops footy

SATURDAY'S storm kept the local SES unit busy, with trees down throughout Numurkah township and across the region.

Numurkah SES unit deployed three units across the district, responding to fallen trees and tree limbs, many of which were blocking roads, in an area encompassing Yalca, Mywee, Strathmerton, Yarroweyah, Muckatah, Katamatite and Invergordon.

One of the units alone covered a distance of 220km throughout the afternoon and evening, clearing trees and limbs from roads before finally returning to base at around 10.30pm.

Of the 16 incidents the three Numurkah crews responded to, none involved residential or business addresses.

The worst of the rain and wind hit during the final quarter of the seniors football match be-

tween Numurkah and Cobram, leading to the lights being turned on and eventually the game being called off, something that hasn't happened in living memory.

SES crews from Cobram, Tocumwal, Echuca and Shepparton were kept equally busy, with a spokesperson from SES North East region office telling the *Leader* that the Hume region got 'really slammed'.

"The other end of the region definitely coped the worst of it," she said.

"Tatura had 58 incidents, one of which caused a family to evacuate their home, and with multiple power lines down, the town was without power until around 5pm on Sunday.

"Kyabram had 38 incidents and also lost power for around eight hours, so it was an extremely busy weekend for local units."

Website helps Vic parents find schools

IT is now easier for parents to find out what school zone they live in, with the recent launch of a new interactive website.

The Find My School website means, for the first time, Victorian parents will be able to enter their home address online and see their local school zone.

The website allows parents to search for their closest school as well as find other nearby government schools. Schools can be found by typing in a residential address or suburb or searching by school name or categories such as primary, secondary, or specialist school.

A number of anomalies in school zoning have also been addressed.

Previously, some homes were excluded from a school zone, and in some cases school

boundaries overlapped.

The website also includes zones for the new schools opening in 2020.

The new website will provide parents with clarity and consistency on what their government school options are.

Every child has the right to enrol at their closest government school. School choice is also very important.

Schools have always had the choice to accommodate children living outside a school's zone if there is enough space – this will not change.

No student currently enrolled in a school will be required to change schools.

Tailgating voted the worst

A SURVEY of Australian drivers has revealed that the greatest peeve on Australian roads, with a vote of 78%, is tailgating.

Changing lanes without indicating came a very close second at 77%, whilst leaving high-beams on cruised into third with 64%.

As far as rating our own driving, 97% of respondents consider themselves safe drivers, even though 78% admitted to committing some of the above annoying acts on the road.

The vast majority of drivers - a whopping 89% - said that other drivers have got them hot under the collar with bad driving manners or behaviour, with 20% going as far to say that they have had a road accident related to feeling annoyed or stressed out on the road.

Drivers from Victoria and NSW are the most confident in their driving prowess, with 73% of respondents from each state rating themselves a better driver than most people.

Despite this glowing self-assessment, Victorians confess they've at times committed annoying driving behaviours, with 37% admitting to not letting other drivers in, 29% admitting to forgetting to indicate, and 28% admitting to being overly polite and letting everyone in when they've had right of way.

Inside the car, 34% of Victorians are most stressed by passengers giving directions and arguments with a loved one when driving, and 30% of Victorians - the highest rate across the nation - are more likely to say no to driving because they don't want to face traffic.

MINISTER APPROVES VOLUNTARY AMALGAMATION

The Minister for Health has approved a proposal for the voluntary amalgamation of Nathalia District Hospital, Cobram District Health and Numurkah District Health Service, to enhance access to local health care for communities.

The new organisation 'NCN Health' will operate under a combined management and governance structure from 1 July 2019.

The Andrews Labor Government has provided \$175,000 in funding to support the transition.

The existing hospitals and facilities at Nathalia, Cobram and Numurkah will remain in place, in their current locations, and services will be maintained and enhanced. Urgent Care Centres, clinical services, aged care, primary health, allied health and all other health services will remain in place. The local identity of each facility will be preserved.

There will be no loss of services, staffing or funding. Staff are valued and all staff will transfer across to the new organisation in their current roles and locations. Volunteers are also an integral part of the organisations and will remain with each campus.

The merger will be business as usual. The CEO, Jacque Phillips, is continuing in the leadership role and has been managing the three entities over the past 12 months. A combined management structure is well advanced with a range of senior management positions in place across the campuses.

The new entity will enable significant opportunities for the growth of health services and the provision of new services that meet the needs of the three communities.

The Board will have local representation from each community and three Community Advisory Groups will be established to ensure local health needs are heard. These are in addition to existing Consumer Liaison Committees.

There will be one Budget for the organisation from 1 July 2019 and local funding will remain local. Reserves at each organisation will be kept for local priorities. Donations and items will remain with each facility/location.

The proposal for voluntary amalgamation was approved by the Minister for Health and the Department of Health and Human Services. It was also unanimously supported by the three Boards following extensive community and staff consultation, due diligence assessment, and careful consideration of the benefits and issues - with focus on improving access to care for local communities. The independent Due Diligence Report found no major issues of concern on the proposal to join services - this included a comprehensive assessment of clinical, financial, governance, regulatory and human resource matters.

IF you're in the vicinity of the bowls club sports precinct in Numurkah any time soon, you may see a pet poster of a different type than usual - a 'not-lost' cat poster.

The posters feature George the cat, and alert the public to the fact that if they see George wandering the area to let him go about his business, because he's not lost, he's actually home.

George has been resident at the precinct for around 12 months, ever since he turned up out of the blue looking skinny and scrawny and in need of some love.

Now George, who has been vet-checked and de-sexed, happily lives at the bowls club, sleep-

ing in his bed, or under the clubrooms, when he's not following grounds keeper Don Staggard around.

Observing bowls club members with George, it is clear that he is as loved as any pet that resides in a normal family home, a fact Don Staggard confirms.

"Everybody loves him because he's so friendly," Don said.

Although George is very much Don's shadow at this time of year, following him around the greens as he goes about ensuring they are in top condition, in summer he is very much Geoff Sutcliffe's shadow.

"Geoff is the tennis club curator and he arrives first in the summer months so George greets him when he gets here in the morning and sticks with him."

Though at least three of the members of the bowls club admit to feeding George every day, he shows no signs of being overweight, as he gets plenty of exercise.

"He chases the bowls when you send them down the green, and in summer he chases the tennis balls around when the kids are training, so you could say he's an active member of both clubs," Don said.

The recent signage alerting the public to

George's identity was prompted by the actions of a well-meaning local who thought that George, who doesn't wear a collar, was a stray and took him home.

Carol Storer, who created the posters, said that George wasn't gone long.

"He came back, because he already had a home," she said.

"We just want to avoid that happening again and let people know that he lives here and he's quite happy about it."

"He's a stray who won't leave, and that's fine by us," Don said.

"He'd be very sadly missed if he ever left."



Kerbside organic waste service expands shire-wide

Due to the success of the initial kerbside organic service in 2014 to residential areas in our four main towns, Council has given the green light to expand the service shire-wide. This expansion will take place in two key stages:

First stage – The un-serviced areas of Cobram, Numurkah and Yarrawonga plus the township of Tungamah will receive the service in September.

Second stage – The townships of Barmah, Bundalong, Katamatite, Katunga, Picola, St James, Strathmerton, Waaia, Wilby, Wunghnu and Yarroweyah will receive the service in October.

What is the kerbside organic waste service?

Residents will receive a 240 litre wheelie bin, a small kitchen caddie and a roll of compostable bags.

Our kerbside collection service will empty your organics wheelie bin each fortnight and we will provide a new supply of bags each year.

The kitchen caddie and bags allow you to conveniently and cleanly collect kitchen food scraps and dispose of them in the wheelie bin. Other waste such as garden waste and animal droppings can be disposed of directly into the wheelie bin.

Is organic waste the same as green waste?

Our organics waste service allows you to dispose of a wide range of waste including:

- Food scraps including meat, bones and other animal products
- Leaves, bark, weeds and grass clippings
- Small prunings and branches
- Saw dust from untreated timber
- Animal droppings and manure

Strathy pedestrian crossing bad for business

STRATHMERTON business owners say they have taken a hit in the hip-pocket, since a pedestrian crossing was built in the middle of the Murray Valley Highway in the town.

Plans for the crossing were announced in mid 2018, when Strathmerton locals were fighting to have the speed limit through the town reduced from 80kph to 60kph.

The speed limit was eventually reduced in early April 2019, and the crossing, which was constructed by Moira Shire with a \$50,000 community safety grant from VicRoads, was constructed in May.

Strathmerton Bakery owner Glenda Kelly, whose business is located in the service road on the northern side of the highway, said she noticed an immediate drop in business.

"As soon as it went up we lost around 60 customers a day, and it has stayed that way," she said.

The crossing provides a barrier so people can't see the turn into the service road, and they don't realise that is where they need to turn to get to us."

Many drivers who miss the turn into the service road then execute a right hand turn into Maguire St and then turn right into the Caltex service station, using it for access to the service road.

An employee of the Caltex service station told the *Leader* that they are seeing slightly less vehicles coming straight through their forecourt since broken lines were added in front of the service road turn, but not many.

"The broken lines are useless without a 'right hand turn permitted into service road' sign leading

up to the crossing," he said.

"People either can't see the turn or think they're not allowed to take it. It's ridiculous."

Mrs Kelly agrees wholeheartedly.

"When VicRoads came to look at the situation through town last year they were intent on putting a crossing there and I told them that if they must put it in they needed to put it much further east."

"With it located here, anyone travelling west is more or less prevented from using the businesses in the service road."

"I've said for years that if there's only one chance to turn in to access

these businesses, then they need a sign letting people know well in advance, and that applies now more than ever."

The original proposed location of the crossing was in fact slightly further west, but was amended slightly, being moved a few metres further east, following community concerns.

For Mrs Kelly, it was nowhere near far enough.

"It creates a real physical barrier for traffic to access the service road, especially if they're towing something," she said.

Mrs Kelly said the drop in busi-

ness the bakery has experienced since the crossing went in far eclipses that caused by any other event in its 23 year history.

"Even when there was flooding that cut off river access, or when there was blue-green algae, it wasn't this bad, and those things were just temporary too."

"Even on the June long weekend just gone, when we would usually be flat out, we were quiet. This could very well send us out of business, and then there won't be any need for a crossing, because there will be nothing to cross the road to."

Beware of scammers impersonating the tax office

THE Australian Tax Office (ATO) is warning everyone about the continuation of pre-recorded phone calls from last year which impersonated the legitimate tax office phone numbers.

"Scammers are sending pre-recorded messages in record numbers and are manipulating caller identification so that your phone displays a legitimate ATO phone number, despite coming from an overseas scammer." Assistant Commissioner Gavin Siebert said.

"If the scammers do make contact, they will request payment of a tax debt – usually through unusual methods like bitcoin, gift cards and vouchers. Legitimate ways to pay your tax debt are listed on our website."

"The scammers will threaten you with immediate arrest, attempt to keep you on the line until payment is made and may become rude or aggressive," he said.

The ATO has received 40,225 reports of impersonation scams so far in 2019, with just over \$1 million in losses.

The technique of displaying misleading phone numbers is known as "spoofing" and is commonly used by scammers in an attempt to make their interactions with taxpayers appear legitimate.

"Taxpayers should be wary of any unexpected phone call, text message or email claiming to be from the tax office."

"While we may contact you in these ways, if it doesn't seem right, independently find our phone number and check if the contact was legitimate."

"If you receive a pre-recorded message claiming to be from us, either hang up or simply delete the voicemail." Mr Siebert said.

NUMURKAH AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY EXECUTIVE MEETING.

The monthly meeting of the executive of the Agricultural Society was held on Tuesday, last, when there were present Messrs J. S. Christie (President), F. McKenna, J. Findlay vice - Presidents), Harper (treasurer), Hooper, Hodgson, Moss, Allen (2). McLean, Mitchell, Kilpatrick, Leavay (2), Corrin, Thornton, Christie, jun., Fowler (2) Sutcliffe, Grant, Trengrove, Adams, Mills, Gordon, and Fairless (secretary).

The Peace Treaty.

It having been reported that day that the peace treaty had been signed by Germany, the meeting rose and sang the National Anthem, and cheers were given for Britain and her Allies. The President was cordially congratulated upon occupying the position in such an eventful year, and in reply said that all were overjoyed at the good news. It was indeed cheering to know that no further loss of life need be feared. It had been a long, cruel war, and there was scarcely one in the room who had not suffered in some way in the death or wounding of relatives. It was a matter of congratulation that the sacrifices made had not been in vain, and it was to be hoped that there would be no war either in our or our children's time.

Cost of Re-Construction.

The secretary reported that the total cost of re-constructing the society was £15/3/1.

Mr Kilpatrick said the statement came as a very agreeable surprise, and reflected the very highest credit upon those responsible. They had raised over £1100, and to do that and issue debentures, as well as to carry out the manifold details connected with the work at a cost of only £15 showed how enthusiastic the promoters were in the work. He moved that the best thanks of the society be tendered those responsible. Seconded by T. Allen and carried.

CAPTURED.

It was in the vicinity of Fleubaix, France, that we fell into the hands of the enemy. I will not dwell on the why, or wherefore, that the misfortune befel us. There are others, who are in a better position than I am, to judge on that. We had gone over the top on the 19th July, 1916, and took two lines of trenches. We held the German second line all night, suffering very heavy casualties. About an hour after dawn we, a small party, could discern through the mist the enemy in large numbers in front and rear. Then we realised that our only hope was that reinforcements would be sent to our assistance. We were about 500 yards distant from our original front line, and our numbers were too few to charge back. In the grey morning light their grey uniforms and spike helmets gave them the appearance of a lot of devils bobbing about. Our rifle fire was not sufficient to keep them at bay, and in a very short time they were on us. Those fortunate, or unfortunate, enough to be left standing were taken prisoner. About ten of us were escorted out by several Fritzes, not caring much what became of us. Our own shell fire was playing havoc in their lines, and we did not expect to get through alive. They were mad with rage, and we were threatened from all quarters. One of our guards was killed by a shell, and one of our number got some shrapnel in the face. A German sergeant, who was frantic with rage and frothing at the mouth levelled his revolver at us, and shouted in English, "You — sons of —". On arrival at their headquarters we were searched, and they were very careful to take all knives and sharp instruments from us. We were feeling pretty knocked up, and were taken over by the Uhlans. Our numbers kept increasing by the addition of small batches of other unfortunates.

New netball courts a step closer

NETBALL courts capable of hosting an A-grade grand final are now within Numurkah's grasp.

Numurkah Football Netball Club (NFNC) received \$200,000 for the project in Moira Shire's 2019/2020 budget, which represents the lion's share of the project's cost, which is estimated to be around \$270,000.

The club already has some funds allocated towards its share, and is also looking to secure in-kind contributions towards the project.

The costs will cover two flexi-pave netball courts, lighting, spectator and coaching facilities and, it's hoped, an electronic score-

board.

Former club president Paul Arnel, who has been a driving force behind the project, couldn't be happier.

"This is something we have needed and wanted in Numurkah for a long time and it will be a good thing for everyone," he said.

Current club president John Beitzel told the Leader that there is currently nowhere in the shire capable of hosting an A-grade grand final.

"We are looking forward to having an A-grade facility that the town and the shire can be proud of," he said.

Current plans are for the

new facilities to be constructed in the empty area immediately to the north of the clubrooms, in between the Agricultural and Pastoral Society's poultry shed and the cricket nets.

Mr Arnel said that rebuilding on the location of the current courts is out of the question, due to it being right next to the car park.

"One of the main aims of the project is safety for everyone at the club," he said.

"At the moment we have people constantly moving across the car park to get to and from the courts, and we really want to put an end to that."

The next step is for the

club to have plans drawn up, which will be presented to the showgrounds committee of management and the Agricultural and Pastoral (A&P) Society committee for approval.

As far as that goes, one major potential stumbling block is the fact that plans for building the courts at that location are likely to require the relocation of the A&P Society's poultry shed.

A&P Society president Bev Patrick said that, although the society supports NFNC and doesn't wish to stand in the way of progress, it has serious concerns about any proposal to

relocate the poultry shed.

"With the flood overlay in that area, and it being adjacent to crown land, we are not convinced of an ability to move it to an appropriate location; and relocating it, with concrete floors and electrics, would be an expensive exercise regardless," Mrs Patrick said.

"We would want written guarantees from the football netball club, the shire and DELWP that the shed would definitely be relocated to an appropriate position approved by us, before we would consider approving any plans to build the netball courts in that position."

Nominations open for Murray Dairy board

MURRAY Dairy is calling for nominations for a farmer and a service provider position on its board of directors coming into the 2019/20 year.

The positions will provide an opportunity to contribute to the direction of industry research, development and extension.

The positions have become available due to the expiration of membership terms of current farmer representative and co-deputy chair, Tony McCarthy, and service-provider representative, Chris Thomas. Both current directors are eligible for renomination for a second term.

The board represents the dairy industry across the Murray region of northern Victoria and southern NSW. They are responsible for the oversight and governance of Murray Dairy, the regional arm of Dairy Australia, providing localised programs for the development of dairy farmers and the service sector.

Current chair and dairy farmer, Karen Moroney, strongly encouraged those interested to put themselves forward.

"I believe that board composition is key to successfully guiding and transforming any business," she said.

"More than ever, we need to shape our boards with people who are going to hold us accountable, who will question and really engage in what counts for now and in the future."

"Board diversity is important in that aspect, especially in terms of age and gender,

when we talk about shaping the future."

"The board must be representative of the entire region, with farmers and service providers from varied backgrounds, who run different types of businesses, offering expertise across a spectrum of areas."

The board plays a critical role in guiding the organisation's investment in regional programs such as the seasonal events, research updates, technical courses and discussion groups provided each year.

They work closely with industry partners including education and training providers, processors, the United Dairyfarmers of Victoria (UDV) and all levels of government and associated organisations.

Ms Moroney said the board is committed to addressing the six key areas identified in the strategy: profit, water, planning, systems, people and promotion.

In addition to their existing programs, Murray Dairy will be running new projects in the 2019/20 year to address some of the industry's regional challenges and opportunities including water portfolio management, risk management, alternative farming systems and farm business transition.

Uber Air to launch in Melbourne

MELBOURNE has been chosen as the only city outside the USA to trial Uber's new aerial ride sharing service Uber Air.

Melbourne will join Dallas and Los Angeles as one of the launch cities to trial the service.

Uber Elevate, the division of Uber developing the ambitious ride sharing mode, plans to begin demonstrator flights in late 2020, ahead of launching commercial flights in 2023.

Melbourne is one of only three cities in the world selected to be part of the trial and launch, and was chosen ahead of cities in Brazil, France, India and Japan.

Melbourne was selected following an 18-month process and was chosen for its status as being Australia's leading tech city, its diverse and talented labour pool and ranking as one of the world's most liveable cities.

Uber Air will operate using the Uber app, allowing passengers to travel in electric vertical take-off and landing aircraft, known as eVTOLs, across a network of landing pads called skyports.

The Victorian Government, the Civil Aviation Safety Authority and other key bodies will be working in partnership with Uber Elevate in the lead up to the demonstrator flights.

Aerial ride sharing has the potential to offer direct rides between Victorian attractions and major events, benefiting Victoria's tourism and events industry.

Treasurer and Minister for Economic Development Tim Pallas said the Victorian Government is thrilled that Melbourne has been chosen to partner with Uber Elevate.

"The future of transport is coming to Melbourne, giving us a flying start to capitalise on new opportunities that emerge as this industry takes off," he said.

Early mental illness intervention saves lives

VICTORIANS who have mental health issues – including schizophrenia – are being urged to reach out and get help as shocking figures show a million Australians are being impacted by schizophrenia, and less than 50% of them are actually getting clinical or recovery assistance.

The Mental Illness Fellowship of Australia (MIFA) says that, at just 54 years-old, the life expectancy of people affected by schizophrenia is going backwards, and people with schizophrenia are 12 times more likely to die from suicide than the general population.

MIFA CEO Tony Stevenson says it is alarming to know how many people are not getting help.

"There is massive stigma in Australia in relation to those who have schizophrenia. There are so many ridiculous myths about schizophrenia. We want to dispel those myths," he said.

"It is an absolute myth to believe people with schizophrenia are in some way violent. They are no more likely to be violent than anybody else.

Mr Stevenson said people who have schizophrenia can and do recover, if they have the right recovery support services.

"Obviously you cannot just will schizophrenia away, but make no mistake, there is significant support out there to help people. There are specialists available to assist people with schizophrenia."

Some studies report as many as one in three people fully recover a healthy life in their community, with less severe and less frequent psychotic episodes.

"You have to have evidence based treatment by qualified mental health professionals, and recovery support from experienced community organisations," Mr Stevenson said.

MIFA says a massive 230,000 people across the nation have schizophrenia – approximately 60,000 of them in Victoria.

"The mere fact that the life expectancy of Australians with schizophrenia is 19 years less than

someone else is appalling," Mr Stevenson said.

"We are basically talking about people with schizophrenia having the same life expectancy that people had in the 1930s."

Schizophrenia typically starts during adolescence or early adulthood.

"In the past 15 years we have seen increasing evidence proving early treatment is critical," Mr Stevenson said.

The Mental Illness Fellowship of Australia says there are a number of early warning signs that may indicate somebody may have schizophrenia (or another mental illness).

These include:

- Changes in mood or rapid mood changes.
- Unusual behaviour.
- Excessive sleep and loss of energy or sleep disturbances.
- A person withdrawing and isolating themselves from friends and family.
- A clear decline in work or school perfor-

mance.

• Difficulties with memory and concentration and increased suspiciousness.

Recent research has revealed people living with psychosis in Australia experience higher rates of heart disease, asthma, diabetes, hepatitis, epilepsy, kidney disease and stroke. They also smoke at three times the rate of the general population.

MIFA says the annual costs of psychosis are staggering. Research shows psychosis costs Australian society \$4.91 billion annually. Psychosis costs the Australian Government almost \$3.52 billion annually.

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



A gentleman and a footballer

A LOT of footballers don't get to taste premiership success even once, but Jason Limbrick has played in an incredible nine premierships, eight with the club he started playing his football with.

But, of course, he's been a part of a hugely successful era at Nathalia.

Nathalia. Legendary in the last 15 years, with eight flags since 2006. And Limbrick has been a part of them all.

Currently standing in as interim coach after the resignation of Phil Carroll just a few weeks ago, Limbrick played his 250th game with the Purples against Rumbalara on Saturday, typically, with a best on ground performance.

While 250 games is an amazing record, he also had stints with the Shepp Bears and Golden Square.

His year at the Bears was in the under 18s side, an option not available in Murray league football.

"I wasn't ready to play senior footy. I'd just finished up under 17s, was doing year 12 in Shepp, and I probably wasn't ready for senior footy, so to play under 18s was hugely beneficial, and when I did come back, I was much more ready to step right in and play senior footy," Limbrick said.

"It was a really good thing to do, and it definitely helped, studying year 12, to play closer to home."

"I was playing thirds and boundary umpiring at the same time."

He then came back to Nathalia, and enjoyed success in his first year of senior football, which was just a small taste of what was to come.

One year particularly stands out for him, though.

"There has been lots of good stuff, but coaching the premiership in 2015 was extremely rewarding and the highlight, not so much personally, but definitely being able to coach and see those boys win a premiership, their

first of what's now four in a row, was extremely pleasing."

In his previous premiership, in 2012, Limbrick was named the best player in the grand final, and was the league leading goal kicker for the season.

Adding to his impressive CV is an under 17 league medal in 2004, and the under 18 medal in the GVFL in his one year in that league.

He also has a few extra coaching credits, too, having coached the MFL under 18 representative side in 2016, and co-coached the senior interleague side in 2017 and '18, and was an incredibly popular coach at Nathalia from 2013 to 2015 before handing over the reins to Craig Kellow.

"It's a totally different challenge, when you start coaching. You go from really only being concerned about your preparation and game, and all of a sudden you're worrying about what 20 other guys are doing. It's a huge demand on your time, and it's a totally different way of looking at your footy ball, especially when you're younger."

"As the years have gone on, it's a fairly easy balance for me, but when I first started I found it very difficult, and it took a couple of years for me to get used to it."

"Non-playing presents its own challenges. You don't feel as close to it, you feel like you don't really understand what the players are going through, so both have their pluses and minuses."

"The only time I've coached from the sidelines is when I coached the representative team, and that was a very different challenge, for sure."

"As a playing coach, I've been very fortunate to have great people around. Nathalia has been very lucky, there are some fantastic people there."

The 31-year-old says he is lucky to have been at the club at the right time, to enjoy so much success.

"If you go back to the early 2000s,

we weren't so successful. That was Numurkah's time."

"Numurkah was an extremely strong team then and tended to have the wood over Nathalia. It's only been a recent change that we've been stronger."

"These cycles happen. It will change again over time, as people change, and quality of lists change, but the last five years have always been extremely competitive between Nathalia and Numurkah."

"Numurkah is very competitive and we have great respect for what they are doing over there, and the quality of young kids they've had, and have."

"I don't think there's as much in the rivalry thing as there used to be."

When asked about Nathalia's success, he says it's hard to pin point why.

"Really, it's built on the back of good people throughout the whole footy club: players, committee, supporters. Good people doing their bit. No-one doing anything outstanding or special, everyone just plays their role, and I think that's been the key to it."

"The club always has, and continues to, work very hard at our culture, and the environment that it is."

"The club is very organised, very disciplined. Everyone knows what it takes to be good, right through the footy club."

"We like to think that we have extremely high standards about how you should behave, and the respect that they have for the community and supporters. There's a lot of hard work that goes into that, but that's probably the main thing."

"The last thing that tends to happen is that you're successful on field, so we've been working hard at that for a long time, and while we've recently seen success on field, it really starts with all the stuff off the field, and how you behave and what you do."

"Different coaches over the years have sold the same message and kept the plan the same, and continued the hard work that's already been done, so it's always very much business as usual."

"People might move into different roles, but they know what's expected of them, and what's needed, so that helps to continue the good work."

He describes the psychology involved in sport as a big part of a successful team.

"I think the psychology is the biggest influence, belief and faith in what it is your footy club's doing, believing that you can be successful is the biggest thing to being a strong club, that's where it starts."

"We've always been big on that with our players, about having confidence in their ability, and playing to their strengths. That's the biggest influence really."

Limbrick says he was lucky to play with some fantastic footballers early in his career, but is equally as proud to be playing with some of the younger guys currently in his team.

"Early on, I got to play with Ash and Nathan Gemmill, Brendon Parker and Danny Bourke and the likes, and they taught me what good footy looked like."

"And John Nihill was also a huge influence, both as a coaching mentor, and as a young footballer. He has had a big impact on me, both as a person and a footballer."

"They played footy at a very high standard, so I learnt from them. They were some of the best players getting around in country footy, so I was very fortunate to play with them in the early days."

"And now, some of the young guys we have, like Tom Nihill, Alex Hicks, Bowen Smith, they are extremely talented players."

"So I've played at both ends, some really good older guys when I started, and now I've played with some fantastic young talent as well. I've been very fortunate."

Nathalia has become renowned for keeping its players. If they do move away, it's for a short stint somewhere else, and then they head back to the purple and gold.

"I think the footy is second, they want to come back to be around their friends and good people."

"It's a place they can feel comfortable, it's a place they can be themselves, it's a place where they don't get judged. It's a place where everyone is appreciated for what they bring."

"I think that's what brings most people back, rather than whether we're at the top of the ladder or bottom of the ladder."

"Kids feel safe, and people feel valued, I think that's the most important thing."

Described by his club as able to play forward or back, a great reader of the game and decision maker, a strong mark and accurate kick, Limbrick says he has no real preference for position, he will play wherever is best for the team.


"I've probably played half my career both forward and back, it really depends on what the team's doing and what other players we have available."

And he's not ready to give up footy yet.

"Oh, who knows? Hopefully there's a little bit more footy left in me, but it gets a lot harder when you get to this age, with other commitments, but I'm still enjoying my footy. As long as I'm playing well enough, I'll keep playing."
