Finally gone!

THE day many feared would never happen in time to avoid a catastrophic event has finally arrived - by the end of this week, Numurkah's notorious tyre stockpile will finally have been cleared.

More than a decade after Moira Shire Council issued a planning permit for a tyre recycling plant on the Saxton St West site, and five years since it commenced legal proceedings to have the dangerous eyesore removed, the last tyre has finally been removed from the site.

State Minister for Energy, Environment and Climate Change, Lily D'Ambrosio, visited the site yesterday to acknowledge the occasion.

Minister D'Ambrosio said that the tyre stockpile could only have been described as a significant disaster waiting to happen.

"I am pleased to be here on what is a very important day for the local community, and I want to acknowledge the forbearance of the community as they have waited for this issue to be dealt with," Minister D'Ambrosio said.

Moira Shire Mayor Libro Mustica told the gathering that he felt tremendous pride in the work of everybody who had combined to make the removal

of the stockpile a reality.

"I want to congratulate the EPA, Tyrecycle and Moira Shire Council staff on their efforts to remove this dangerous stockpile which has been within metres of homes and businesses, and posed a danger for so long," Cr Mustica said.

"It was a daunting prospect to remove it in such a short space of time, but by working efficiently together, we have made it happen."

When the announcement of the clearance project was made in early December, Minister D'Ambrosio praised independent member for Shepparton Suzanna Sheed for being a strong advocate for the issue throughout her years in parliament.

This week, however, Ms Sheed gave the credit to the people of Numurkah for keeping the issue on the political agenda.

"The Numurkah community should be very proud of their tireless advocacy and I would like to congratulate them for keeping the issue on the agenda," she said.

"Having vocal support in the community makes it so much easier for local representatives such as myself and Moira Shire to get the attention of govern-

ment and get work such as this done.

"The Numurkah tyre dump has been a safety threat to local residents and an eyesore in the region for too long and it's wonderful to see this difficult episode finally coming to an end."

In June 2018, the CFA assessed the potential consequences of a fire at the premises as 'catastrophic' and the likelihood of a fire at the premises to be 'likely', resulting in an overall risk rating of 'extreme'.

The clean-up operation has been undertaken by the Environment Protection Authority Victoria (EPA), with project management by Moira Shire and funding of \$1.5 million provided by the State Government.

The EPA used its powers under the Environment Protection Act 1970 to enter the site and remove the stockpile, after other legal options had been exhausted.

When she visited Numurkah in December for the announcement of the project, EPA Victoria CEO Kathy Wilkinson said that the EPA had been legally prevented from taking any action to remove tyres from the site until legal proceedings against Side-bottom Group Pty Ltd had run their course.

“There have been a range of administrative and legal processes that needed to take place before we could become involved with the clearance of the site,” Ms Wilkinson said.

“But now that we are able to proceed we won’t relax and we won’t rest until the last tyre has been removed.”

Ms Wilkinson has proved as good as her word. Up to eight trucks a day have taken loads of tyres for shredding and recycling at an EPA licensed facility in Melbourne.

At the time of the announcement, EPA Victoria North East Regional Manager Emma Knight estimated that work would take around 10 weeks to complete.

Despite work needing to be halted on days of total fire ban - of which there have been seven since work began to clear the site on December 11, 2018 - the

work has been completed within 11 weeks.

The fight to have the site cleared began in 2014, when Moira Shire took the dump’s owners, Sidebottom Group Pty Ltd, to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Appeals Tribunal (VCAT) for numerous violations of planning conditions, following a fire at the site in 2013.

VCAT found Sidebottom Group to be in breach of planning conditions and ruled a number of steps must be completed, which included the removal of waste and combustible items, in stages to be completed by January 2015.

Sidebottom Group failed to abide by the VCAT order, and also failed to meet deadlines relating to a number of time extensions granted, both by VCAT and the Supreme Court, to which the case eventually progressed.

Shanan Sidebottom, sole director of Sidebottom Group, was found guilty of criminal con-

tempt in the Supreme Court in October last year, and sentenced to four months jail for failing to comply with the VCAT order.

Sidebottom Group Pty Ltd, was also convicted and fined \$50,000 for criminal contempt.

The EPA has confirmed that it will look to recoup the costs of the operation from Sidebottom Group Pty Ltd.

EPACEO Kathy Wilkinson told the *Leader* that, under the Environment Protection Act, it has the power to pursue cost recovery through a range of means.

“We will be using every power at our disposal to recover the costs of the operation from the owners of the site,” she said.

Ms Wilkinson confirmed that one of the cost recovery options available to the EPA is the seizure and sale of the land on which the stockpile is located, which is owned by Sidebottom Group Pty Ltd.

Lovell raises local issues with ministers

LIBERAL member for Northern Victoria Wendy Lovell has used the first weeks of the new Victorian parliament to raise issues of concern to Numurkah district locals.

Ms Lovell has used two adjournment debates to challenge government ministers to commit to providing the State Government’s share of funding for the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Plan, and to take action on the reduction of the speed limit through Strathmerton.

In each case, the relevant Minister has 30 days from when the issue was raised to provide a written response to Ms Lovell.

Ms Lovell raised the matter of flood plan funding with Minister for Water Lisa Neville last Tuesday.

Ms Lovell told the minister that the Numurkah community had worked hard on the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Project for many

years, appointing a Flood Action Group to work with Moira Shire to identify the best option to mitigate a flood event.

Ms Lovell was unimpressed by Minister Neville’s prior announcement of State Government funding for the Numurkah flood plan, as reported in the *Leader* on March 7, 2018.

Ms Neville was reported in the *Leader* at that time as saying “I can assure you that the Andrews Labor Government commits to our funding contribution under these arrangements, in partnership with the Moira Shire and the Federal Government.”

Ms Lovell told the *Leader* this week that Ms Neville’s statement was very carefully worded to give an impression of funding, but did not represent a firm commitment from the State Government.

“If the minister was serious about funding the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Plan we would have seen an election commitment,” Ms Lovell said.

“The minister needs to stop being misleading with her wording and make a firm commitment to fund the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Plan, and it should be in this year’s budget.

“The residents of Numurkah deserve protection from the impact of future flooding and I call on the Andrews Labor Government to provide funding to help implement this project.”

In October last year, Ms Lovell visited Numurkah with deputy Nationals leader Steph Ryan, to announce that the Liberal National Coalition would provide the state’s \$5.6 million share of the funding for the flood plan if they were elect-

ed at the November 2018 election.

Ms Lovell also raised the issue of the Strathmerton speed limit with Minister for Roads, Road Safety and the TAC Jaala Pulford in parliament’s first week back for the year.

Ms Lovell said that there are legitimate concerns about the safety of pedestrians crossing the road with the current 80km/h speed zone.

“The residents and visitors to Strathmerton continue to negotiate a dangerous Murray Valley Highway with vehicles travelling at 80km/h through town,” Ms Lovell said.

“The new Minister needs to apply common sense and immediately order the reduction of the speed limit for this section of the Murray Valley Highway from 80km/h to 60km/h to improve safety for the Strathmerton community.”

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Locals walk away with Georgy awards

NUMURKAH district is alive with the sound of talent, with two local youngsters scoring coveted awards for the performing arts, at this year's Georgy awards.

St Mary of the Angels year 11 student Digby Bunnett took out the award for Best Junior Performance (Male), for his performance as Man in Chair in the college's 2018 production of The Drowsy Chaperone.

Numurkah's Chloe Hicks, meanwhile, was surprised to receive a Judges Award for Excellence for her portrayal of Anne in Numurkah Singers' 2018 production of Anne of Green Gables. Judges awards may be made to people who gave outstanding performances, but don't qualify for major awards.

Digby, for whom this was his third Georgy nomination, described his character Man in Chair, who narrates The Drowsy Chaperone, as quite a sad character - an introvert who has been unlucky in love and uses music as an escape.

Digby said he thought he might be in with a chance when he was asked to open the awards ceremony with a monologue from his performance, but was still surprised when his name was read out as winner.

"I was calm before the announcement because there were a lot of talented people nominated in that category who had won in the past. I didn't really expect to win, so it was exciting when they read my name out."

Georgys judge Joyce Baker told the *Leader* that Digby's performance was outstanding.

"He is a very mature performer who should have a very bright future," she said.

Digby, who is currently studying VCE Drama units three and four, would like to pursue a career in the performing arts.

Chloe, not realising she was in the running for an award, wasn't there when her name was announced.

She chose to skip the ceremony in favour of attending a friend's birthday party, and didn't know she had won until her mum picked her up.

"I was pretty surprised because I wasn't nominated, so it never occurred to me I would win something," she said.

Ms Baker said that the judges were very impressed by Chloe's portrayal of Anne.

"She covered both the singing and dialogue very confidently, and gave such a vibrant performance for such a young girl," she said.

Chloe said that Anne was fun to play because, like herself, she has a 'no filter' personality.

"I didn't really know what she was like, or how I was going to play her, until I watched the movies, but then I got her. It's different to playing a really sensible character because you can let loose a bit more," she said.

Unlike Digby, Chloe doesn't plan to pursue a career in the performing arts, preferring just to keep it as a hobby.

"I'd like to do something in the allied health field," she said.

"I'd probably like to do productions when I'm at university, because I love to sing and play different characters, but it's not something I'd pursue as a career."

A 33 year-old Numurkah man has been charged with possession of an unregistered firearm, after police located an air pistol in his bedroom last week.

The man was bailed to appear in court in May.

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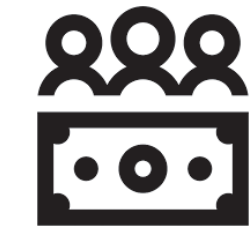

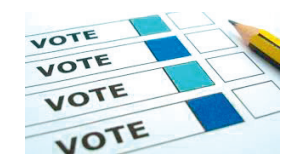

Near miss rattles Strathy

A NEAR miss on the Murray Valley Highway in Strathmerton last Friday morning has given added urgency to calls for the speed limit through the town to be reduced.

The incident occurred at around 8.10am Friday morning, when the town’s school crossing supervisor was almost hit by a car that sped through the crossing.

The crossing supervisor, Margaret Devereux, is prevented from speaking to the media due to conditions of her contract with Moira Shire Council, but the *Leader* was able to speak to a Strathmerton resident who witnessed the incident at close range, and spoke to the *Leader* on condition of anonymity.

Though the incident occurred during the time when the speed limit is reduced to a school zone limit of 40kph, the witness estimated the vehicle to be going at least 60kph.

“Marg was standing in the middle of the crossing and had just blown her whistle for a young kid to cross the road, when the car blew through and came within about a metre of her,” the witness said.

“Marg was pretty shaken, and I don’t blame her, it was close.”

The witness said that if the child, who had been waiting on the south side of the crossing, had already stepped out onto the road, he would almost certainly have been hit.

“The car passed between where he was standing and where Marg was in the middle of the road, so if the kid had stepped off the kerb, he’d have had nowhere to go. At the speed the car was going, it would have been bad.”

“The driver didn’t stop, didn’t even blink, just kept right on going.”

The *Leader* understands that a badly shaken Ms Devereux refused to leave her post, and a local resident came and stayed with her for the remainder of her shift.

Carolyn Ryan, who has been a vocal advocate for the reduction of the speed limit through the town, said that she saw Ms Devereux about an hour after the incident, after her shift on the crossing had ended, and she still appeared badly shaken.

“She came into the cafe for a drink and as soon as I saw her I knew something had happened because she didn’t look right at all,” Ms Ryan said.

“She was grey.”

Ms Ryan said that, although the incident occurred when a 40kph zone was in place, she has no doubt that the 80kph speed zone signs, located around 50 metres ahead of the flashing 40kph zone signs, contributed to the offending vehicle’s speed.

“They just hadn’t slowed down enough from 80, so they were still going way too fast. If they had been doing 60 to begin with, then they mightn’t have been going so fast when they got to Marg.”

“Obviously, they should have stopped, but if they had hit her, then 20kph difference could be the difference between life and death.”

Ms Ryan said she spent the morning following the incident making phone calls to anybody she thought could help with the issue, including the office of the deputy prime minister, Federal Minister for Transport, Michael McCormack.

“They couldn’t do anything to help me then and there but they gave me some good advice as to what to do next.”

Ms Ryan said she also contacted the offices of local members Suzanna Sheed and Wendy Lovell.

“People just don’t understand what this sort of thing does to you when you have a history of road trauma in your family like I do,” Ms Ryan said.

“When something like this happens, it brings everything back.

“It’s like our lives here don’t matter.”

The matter has been reported to the police.

Conversion therapy to be outlawed in Victoria

IN an Australian first, the Victorian Government will bring in laws to denounce and prohibit LGBTI conversion practices.

Conversion therapy is any practice or treatment that seeks to change, suppress or eliminate an individual’s sexual orientation or gender identity.

Premier Daniel Andrews joined Minister for Equality Martin Foley, Minister for Health Jenny Mikakos and many other Labor Government Members at the 2019 Midsumma Pride March to ‘celebrate the huge contribution LGBTI Victorians make to our state’.

The ban follows an extensive investigation into conversion practices by the Health Complaints Commissioner (HCC), who found those subjected to it experienced long-term psychological harm and distress.

The HCC recommended legislation be introduced to clearly and unequivocally denounce conversion practices and prohibit them in law – a recommendation the State Government has accepted in full.

Minister for Equality Martin Foley said that conversion practices have caused untold trauma to too many Victorians who were made to feel ashamed for who they were and who they loved.

“We’re banning these practices forever and for good,” he said.

Premier Daniel Andrews described conversion therapy as a harmful, prejudiced and discredited practice.

“So called ‘conversion therapy’ is not therapy at all, and soon it will be against the law,” he said.

The government has also given in-principle support to funding counselling and support services for survivors, and will work on developing a comprehensive and tailored package of supports for survivors.

Since being elected in 2014, the Labor Government has invested more than \$60 million in initiatives designed to make our community fairer and more equal for LGBTI Victorians.

Development of legislation to denounce and prohibit conversion practices will begin immediately, and will include extensive consultation with survivors, the LGBTI taskforce and community and faith-based organisations.

Health service boards respond to community concerns

THE *Leader's* recent Q&A with NDHS board chairperson Michael Buha gained a strong response from our readers, as evidenced by last week's Letters to the Editor section.

The chairs of the three health services' boards - Michael Buha from Numurkah, Susan Logie from Nathalia and Dale Brooks from Cobram - have noted the concerns expressed, and provided responses to the issues raised.

A statement provided by the board chairs said that the proposal to join Nathalia, Cobram and Numurkah health services aims to improve access to health care for local communities.

The board chairs said the recent consultation sessions highlighted a number of health service gaps that could be addressed through a formally joined service.

They identified some of the biggest health issues raised by the community as the need for: more mental health services, children's health services, more GPs after hours, more specialists, more aged care, dialysis, chronic disease services, drug and alcohol services, public dental, transport, cancer services, women's services and more.

The statement included the following list, titled 'the facts':

- The proposal to join services aims to combine the management and governance of the three organisations under one entity, pending ministerial approval.
- Existing facilities will remain in place, in their

current locations. Current services will be maintained and enhanced to improve access and deliver the best possible health care locally.

- There will be no reduction in services, no hospitals closing, no loss of staffing or funding.
- We recognise the importance of each health service continuing to maintain its own identity and special unique character.
- As part of the proposal, a new board would be created in line with state government policy. In any future combined board, there would continue to be representatives from each community to ensure each community has a voice. It would also be planned to have community advisory groups from each community to ensure local needs are always understood.
- A due diligence analysis of financial, clinical, human resource and governance matters, has also been undertaken.
- Community consultation and communication has been extensive and will be ongoing.

Susan Logie, board chair of Nathalia District Hospital, said that the hospital boards care about the local community and want to improve health outcomes.

"The proposal to join services is about keeping and enhancing existing services and facilities, as well as providing new services that will meet the changing needs of our three communities," Ms Logie said.

Michael Buha, board chair of Numurkah District Health Service, said that the boards are re-

sponding to community feedback that they need to keep services local, reduce travel, improve quality of care, provide new services, attract more doctors and specialists, and retain and attract more staff.

"By working together formally, we can ensure we have strong hospitals that can sustain health services into the future," he said.

Dale Brooks, board chair of Cobram District Health, said that in the eight months since the shared CEO role and memorandum of understanding and service agreements were put in place many partnership initiatives were already under way. These include an urgent care project, new mental health services, respiratory services, enhanced palliative care services, joined education opportunities, community rehabilitation services and integrated planning to prepare for upcoming quality and safety accreditation.

"It is really great to see services operating well and many plans under way to enhance access to local health care. Partnership initiatives already underway. Joining services formally will enable us to achieve much more - and attract funding for new services," he said.

Addressing concerns regarding consultation and communication, the board chairs said that the consultation process has been extensive and communication will continue.

"We have used a variety of methods to reach different age-groups, communities, and staff over the past year, including: six consultation

sessions in Nathalia, Cobram and Numurkah; surveys online and in hard copy; eight community tents; facebook posts reaching more than 14,700 people; advertisements and news story coverage by *Shepparton News*, *Shepparton Adviser*, *Cobram Courier*, *Numurkah Leader*, *Redgum Courier*, and radio," the statement attributed to the three board chairs said.

"We initially sent out 15,000 postcards to households when launching the proposal. We sent over 150 stakeholder letters out to community groups, council, GPs, specialists, other health services and MPs etc. during both consultation periods.

"We have a dedicated NCN website: www.ncnhealthservices.org.au with questions and answers plus information on each health service website; we have presented to staff and the community at numerous meetings; and we have provided updates through newsletters throughout the year."

"We are happy to accept further feedback on the proposal.

Not all amalgamations are bad

I CONSIDER that two matters relevant to the proposal to amalgamate the health services of Cobram, Nathalia and Numurkah may be of interest to your readers, especially those who may have related concerns.

Firstly: This is no rush to judgement and the concept is not a hastily conceived idea to build somebody's empire or to deprive people of the services and care to which they are justly entitled.

The concept of combining operations possibly originated when the three health services combined operations during, and for some years, after the floods of 2012 destroyed the old Numurkah faculty.

This was a period of unprecedented cooperation and understanding between Cobram, Nathalia and Numurkah which, as well as maintaining a viable hospital presence in Numurkah, removed some of the parochialism and competitiveness which existed.

Also, as a result of this very successful experience, proactive board members at all three hospitals began to see that there might be advantages to operating together as a single entity.

A natural flow on from this was to determine if something like this had been, or was being, done elsewhere in Victoria, how successful such ventures might be, and what the attitude of the

government bureaucracies might be to the idea.

In 2017, informal investigations revealed that some rural health services were improving services to their stakeholders by combining. The Department of Health also supported the enquiry, offered funds to assist, and stated that, whatever the outcome of such considerations, there was no pressure for forced amalgamations.

Continued research over the following years by the Cobram, Nathalia and Numurkah boards (in co-operation with Goulburn Valley Health which administered Nathalia) confirmed that combining the three services will strengthen the viability of the three hospitals and create a number of financial, clinical, operative and administrative advantages for all stakeholders.

This proposal was arrived at slowly, after lengthy research by the three volunteer hospital boards, and is now being tested in the public domain.

Secondly: Given the disaster which shire amalgamation forced onto the community in 1995, there is naturally some concern about another so called amalgamation, especially among those who remember what was lost.

However not all amalgamations are negative.

Few people know that just prior to the municipal fiasco, all water boards in Victoria were forced to amalgamate and Cobram, Nathalia and Numurkah water trusts became part of the greatly expanded Goulburn Valley Water Authority.

A very different outcome resulted,

compared to the local government event.

Multiple administrations were replaced with an existing single, efficient and competent management, most existing staff were retained, corporate knowledge was preserved, service delivery became uniform across the region, works which may never have otherwise been possible were (and are being) undertaken in a large number of smaller communities, and the water authority's bargaining power with government was greatly enhanced.

Some of the benefits which Numurkah would probably never have otherwise seen in my lifetime are multiple upgradings of the old water treatment plant at Numurkah, the new state of the art, multi-million dollar water treatment plant which replaced it, piping of treated water from Cobram to Strathmerton and upgrading of the Numurkah sewerage treatment facility.

Because of the complexity of the functions which the health services have to provide compared to a water authority, there is scope for an amalgamation of the hospitals to enjoy even more satisfactory outcomes, many of which have been referred to in your press of February 2019.

I congratulate past and present members of the three Boards for their courage and their far-sightedness with this issue and I consider that only good can come from implementation of the proposal.

As I understand it, the only possible - and in no way certain - advantage amalgamation can offer to all three communities is a potential of extra funding, and to my mind a potential of an outcome is not a sound basis to proceed with this amalgamation.

Moreover, I can confidently say that the community consultation process in relation to this pending hospital amalgamation plan has been at best minimal, certainly not transparent, and virtually non-existent.

One should wonder, if the community consultation process is this flawed, what the community will be in for if amalgamation is to proceed.

I am curious as to what is the driving force for this amalgamation. If the communities don't stand to win anything from it, then who is to gain from this process - is it the hospital management team that could stand to receive increased remuneration for managing three hospitals and not just one?

The last time Numurkah, Cobram and Nathalia were amalgamated was when the local councils amalgamated, and to my mind if amalgamation of the local hospitals gives a similar outcome, we can say good bye to locally focused services that we currently enjoy and get in line with all of Cobram and Nathalia residents to cue for health services.

If this amalgamation goes ahead there will be NO TURNING BACK - there is no DE-AMALGAMATION process.

There is still a chance for all community members to lodge complaints about the amalgamation and the lack of community consultation on this process by writing to The Hon. Do you recognise these faces?

NUMURKAH and District Historical Society is asking local people for help in putting names to the faces in its extensive collection of historical photographs.

The search was prompted when the society provided a number of photos for the *Leader's* 2019 calendar, but was unable to provide all of the names to go with them.

Historical society member Linda Schirmer said that the society's photograph collection was like a gold mine.

"We have thousands of photos dating from the mid 1800s up to the 1970s," she said.

"We have everything from weddings to streetscapes to farming photos, it's a real treasure trove. If there are people in the photos it is great if you can put names to faces."

Linda said that being able to identify people in the society's photos not only assisted in building a narrative of life in the district in days gone by, but also assisted people researching their family history.

"It's really wonderful if someone comes looking and you are able to look up their last name and say 'yes, we have photos of your ancestors,'" she said.

"People get so excited when they can see a great-grandparent or other relative and it really helps them build a picture of where their family came from and who the characters were."

Often, photos come to the historical society in batches, but end up getting separated, so being able to identify the individuals in them allows historical society volunteers to return photos to their appropriate groups.

To publicise their appeal for help, the society has been given the use of a vacant shop-front in Melville St, but anybody wishing to see if they can help them in their identity quest is urged to visit the Numurkah museum.

Even if you think you're unlikely to recognise anybody in the pictures, it is a lovely way to spend an afternoon.

Nurse and midwife ratios loophole closed

NURSE and midwife numbers in Victorian public hospitals should improve, after a loophole regarding nurse to patient ratios was closed with the introduction of new legislation in state parliament last week.

The new legislation will enshrine improved minimum nurse and midwife to patient ratios in law – improvements that should see an extra 600 nurses and midwives employed in Victorian public hospitals.

The amendments to the Safe Patient Care (Nurse to Patient and Midwife to Patient Ratios) Act 2015 mean the number of nurses and midwives on a variety of shifts will be rounded up instead of down, removing a loophole that meant staff were often carrying a workload up to 50% higher than the prescribed ratio.

The law is designed to ensure that nurses and midwives can now devote more time to each patient, with safer care and better health outcomes.

Minister for Health Jenny Mikakos said that the evidence is clear that nurses and midwives who can spend more time with each patient give higher quality care in a safer environment, helping people recover and get back to their lives more quickly.

"These changes mean an extra 600 nurses on our wards and there are more to come, as we build a stronger and safer system," the Minister said.

Ratios will be improved in palliative care, birthing suites and special care nurseries, as well as during peak times in emergency department resuscitation cubicles.

Victorians suffering from stroke, blood disease and cancer will have more nurses caring for them, with new ratios in acute stroke units, haematology wards and acute inpatient oncology.

The Andrews Labor government said it will now start work on more amendments to the Act that will deliver an extra 500 nurses and midwives.

The Labor Government also vowed to deliver on its commitment to create a \$50 million Nursing and Midwifery Workforce Development Fund, which will expand the existing Registered Nurse and Midwife Graduate Program and establish a graduate program for enrolled nurses for the first time.

This will employ 400 newly graduated enrolled nurses over the next four years, meaning Victorians will be able to study a Diploma of Nursing at TAFE – one of the Labor government's free priority TAFE courses – then start work as an enrolled nurse once they graduate.

The fund will also provide up to 400 postgraduate scholarships for current nurses and midwives to upgrade their skills, 400 places in programs such as the Postgraduate Midwifery Employment Program, as well as refresher programs for 800 nurses and midwives currently registered but not practising, so they can re-enter the workforce.

It will also include \$10 million for grants, scholarships, graduate jobs and refreshers for regional students and current nurses and midwives.

"Our fantastic nurses and midwives work hard to look after us when we are at our most vulnerable. We're supporting them with the pay and conditions they deserve, so they can work safely and well," Minister Mikakos said.

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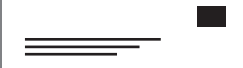

DISTRICT NEWS.

From Our Own Correspondents. NATHALIA.

It is satisfactory to be able to write that our health officer has given the town and district a clean bill of health in regard to the pneumonic influenza epidemic.

Cr. Ball is to be commended for the way he handles Western Riding funds but a bargain he recently struck with a number of ratepayers appears to be carrying the policy of thrift too far. The grader was required for some road work, and Cr. Ball agreed to its use on condition that a number of holes were filled in by those interested. Five men worked with two drays on the work, and seeing that the road is one used by a great number of ratepayers, and the holes were a menace to life and limb, it is generally thought that the work might have been done in the ordinary way.

STRATHMERTON.

The ways of some of the shire councillors are strange. During the late floods many of the roads in the shire became impassable, and travellers were forced to use neighboring paddocks, the use of which was in most cases cheerfully granted.

But some of the owners put in claims for compensation. One owner was voted £10 for the use of his paddock for a few weeks, whilst the claim of a neighbor, who still allows a right-of-way through his property was turned down after three months consideration.

All will agree that public men should handle public money carefully, but an Impartial spirit should be shown at all times, and on the merits of the two cases there appears no doubt that the second owner mentioned had the better claim to compensation.

Stock Eat Poisoned Rabbits.—Mr J. D. Scott, of Delvine Park, found on Saturday that the heavy mortality among his cattle and sheep was caused by the animals eating poisoned rabbits. Dead cattle and sheep had been found lying about for several days, but the cause was not known till Mr Scott found a bullock in the act of swallowing a still warm poisoned rabbit. About 30 cattle and as many sheep have died, representing a loss of about £500 to the owner.

"Local businesses buy trays of cooked sausages and treats for their workers, which we deliver to them for their lunch, so that people who can't make it don't miss out.

"And for the people that can get here, it is a lovely day out by the creek."

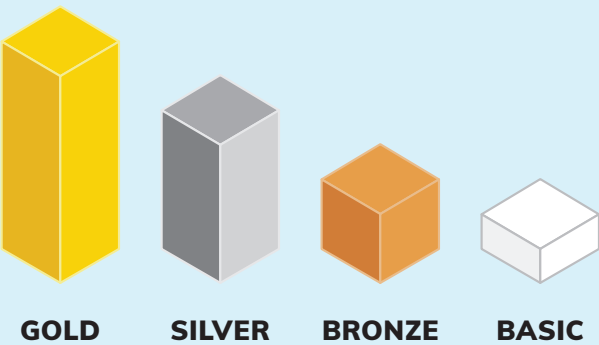

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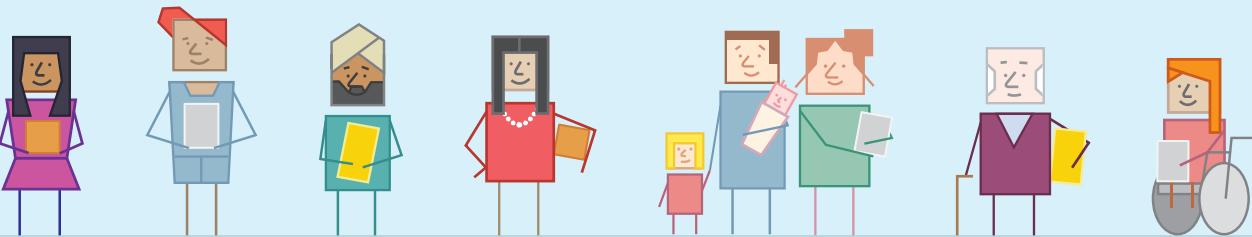

Victory in the house relay was claimed by green house, who won over gold house in a nail-biting finish, with just one metre between them.

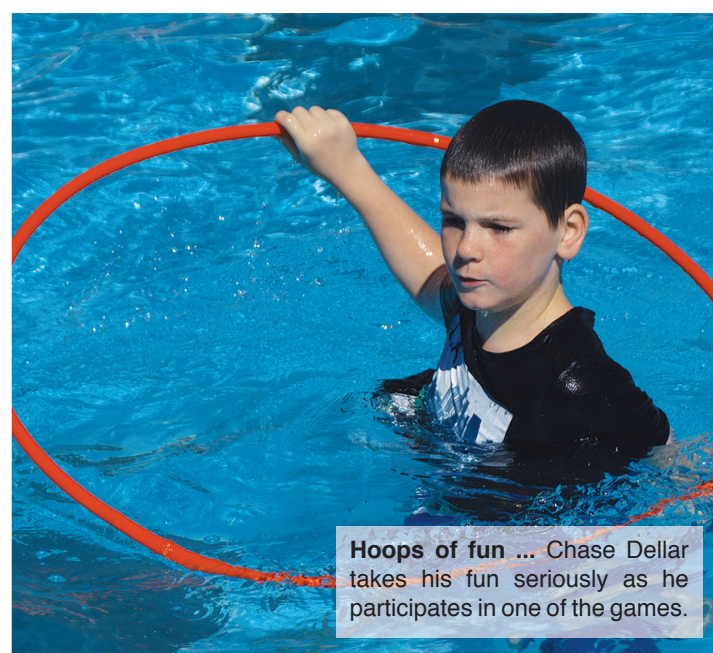
The rivalry was even more fierce in the students-versus-adults race, which featured a modicum of rule bending on both sides.

Though the students claimed victory in that event, Mr Jenner maintained that it was a very, very close contest.

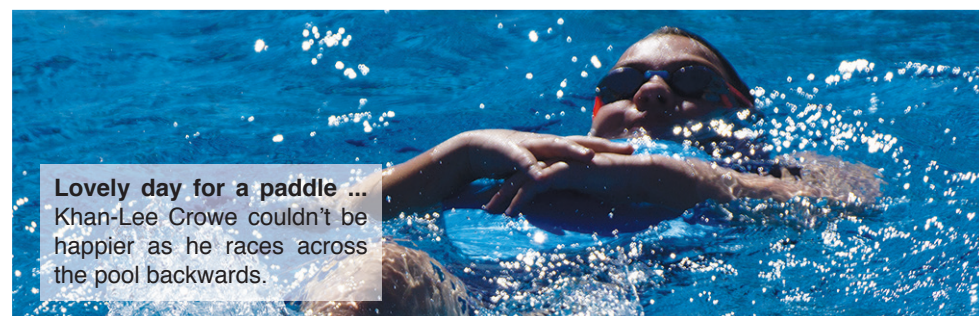
